University Cost At Least \$400

If you're going to send Johnnie and Susie to the University of Nevada this fall, you'd better figure on their expenses running anywhere from \$382.50 to \$750 each year for the school year.

Registration and incidental fees totaling \$15 have been suspended by the board of regents for the 1938-1939 year opening August 29, but university officials estimate that board and room for the eight and a half months, laundry, books, stationery and laboratory and other fees will come to nearly \$400 for even the most frugal collegian.

The expenses are exclusive of personal incidentals, clothing and traveling. There are no tuition charges except for out-of-state students.

The collegian who watches his pennies and nickels will have a total expense of \$382.50 officials estimated, including \$212.50 for board, \$80 for room, \$25 for laundry, \$30 for books, and stationery, and \$35 for laboratory, athletic, medical and other fees. The board and room figures are based upon residence at the dormitories.

Moderately-spending students will spend \$425, including \$225 for board,

\$90 for room, \$35 for laundry, \$35 for books and stationery, and \$40 for fees. The liberal spender will figure on \$570 in expenses, composed of \$300 for board, \$125 for room, \$50 for laundry, \$45 for books and \$50 for fees.

Dormitories at the university will open to students August 27. Freshmen and registration weeks open August 29 with examinations to remove conditions and matriculation and registration.

Regular class work will begin August 31 for three days until the three-day Labor day week-end holiday. Registration closes September 20.
