

Carroll Helped Preserve Homes

Tom Carroll, if he had no other claim to preferment as a candidate for the State Assembly, is entitled to consideration for the things he has done for the protection of home owners against loss of their property.

He served with ability as a member of the assembly in the 1933 legislative session, when the nation wide depression was at its worst, threatening thousands with loss of their homes through mortgage foreclosures and tax sales.

He sponsored and secured that passage in that session of two measures for which every property owner in the state should be thankful. The Act extending the period of redemption from sale under foreclosure of mortgage from six months to one year, gave many owners of homes a breathing spell during which they were able to re-arrange their financing and save their properties.

Even more important was Mr. Carroll's bill readjusting the methods of paying taxes. This bill divided tax payments into four installments scattered over the year, cut down the heavy penalties for delinquencies and extended the period for redemption of tax sales from one to two years.

Both of these measures have been

of great value to every property owner.

Mr. Carroll came to Las Vegas in 1817 and has been active in civic affairs since his arrival. In 1934 he was appointed district manager of the Home Owners Loan Corporation and was instrumental in aiding many to refinance and save their homes.

For two years Mr. Carroll was judge of the Las Vegas Municipal Court and gained many friends by his wise administration of that important trust.

During his residence of more than twenty years in Las Vegas Mr. Carroll has been one of its "City Building" citizens, and hopes to again be elected a member of the assembly to carry out some measures which he started in his previous term. Among these is his bill to provide for regular sittings of the state supreme court in Las Vegas and thus save litigants in the southern part of the state thousands of dollars each year. Mr. Carroll secured the passage of this bill through the assembly, but it died in a committee of the state senate. Next time, he believes, the bill will become a law.

Arrangements will be made to care for those who wish to go to the resort Saturday and stay over night as well as for those who make the trip Sunday only.

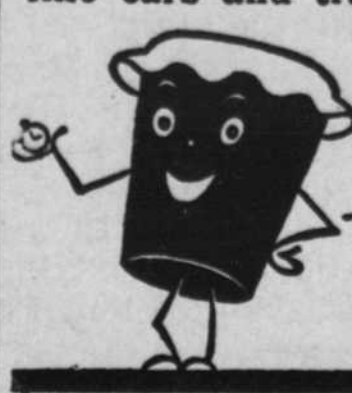

Peach Jelly

3 cups (1½ lbs. juice;) 6½ cups (2¾ lbs.) sugar; 1 bottle fruit pectin.

To prepare juice, remove pits from about 3½ pounds fully ripe peaches. Do not peel. Crush peaches thoroughly. Add ½ cup water, bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 5 minutes. Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice.

Measure sugar and juice into large saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over hottest fire and at once add fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard ½ minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once. Makes about 9 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).
