

## Chamber Hears Of Conference

Attendance at the breakfast meetings of Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce is keeping up well, according to Secretary Oliver Goerman. The meetings are held at the Union Pacific dining room every Tuesday morning at 7:30 during the warm weather.

At last Tuesday's meeting Leonard Wilson of Washington, D. C., who is home on vacation, was a guest as was also C. W. Burton of the western division of the Rural Electrification Administration, who was here passing on the details of the Moapa Valley and Virgin Valley project. Mr. Burton was the guest of W. H. Crozier, electrical engineer representing the district.

C. D. Baker reported that the county commissioners have agreed to loan road equipment and to contribute some money from the fish and game license fund of the county to assist in opening a road from the Boulder highway near Midway, to the shore of Lake Mead in Vegas Wash. This would give Las Vegas contact with the Lake by driving only about sixteen miles.

President Robert Griffith reported on the conference of representatives of the Western Division of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States at Palo Alto, Cal., which he attended. There were 290 delegates present at the conference, were full of interest.

Secretary Goerman, who also attended the conference, made a more detailed report. He quoted John O'Leary, chairman of the executive committee of the U. S. Chamber as the largest number ever to attend, said Mr. Griffith, and the sessions declaring:

"Industry's job today is to hold fast to the system of free enterprise, to repel the forces of government intervention in business and to absorb the unemployment as quickly as possible.

"National progress of the future depends upon voluntary leadership. In all the legislation of recent years there has been a reflection of the desires and hopes of all of us for the advancement of civilization, but, after the passage of those acts, too often the effect has been diametrically opposed to this avowed purpose."

Secretary Goerman reported that

Mr. O'Leary reviewed the tax situation with dismay and pointed out that we cannot take 30 cents in taxes from nearly every dollar of income earned by our people without starving industrial progress and reducing out standards of living.

The report of Secretary Goerman contained highlights from several other distinguished speakers including W. Orval Watts, economist, of Carleton College, Minn.; D. Lane Webber, Los Angeles tax counselor; C. E. Arny, Seattle Radio Commentator; Hugh A. Osborne, president of the Associated Farmers of California; Elmer H. Howlett, president of the M. & M. Association of Los Angeles; Almon E. Roth, president Pacific Coast Water Front Employers Association and Arthur Howland Young, former vice-president of the U. S. Steel Co.

In concluding his most interesting report Secretary Goerman said:

"May I take this opportunity of thanking the membership of Las Vegas Chamber for the privilege of again attending the conference, which is of real educational value, not only in hearing the highly important subjects of the day discussed, but also in meeting the many and working out the problems that are of definite benefit to the communities we live in."
