Four-Aitchers Bloode d Stock

With the improvement of Humboldt County beef cattle as their objective, a group of 4-H Club boys and girls in the northern Nevada county this summer took first steps in the introduction of purebred animals into its herds.

Working with Paul Maloney, Humboldt County agricultural extension agent, the seven boys and girls have purchased 28 purebred registered Herefords as a foundation herd in the new project.

The animals, which will arrive in Winnemucca late in the summer, were chosen only after the boys, accompanied by Maloney, had made a trip of more than 2,000 miles through Nevada, Oregon, Idaho and Utah to inspect herds of desirable Herefords.

Four-Aitchers who are engaged in the project include Mauro Forgnone, Albert Pasquale, Mario

Recanzone, Lyman Schwartz, Fritzie Buckingham, Jean Reed and Rosemary Reed.

Accumulated savings, consisting of money won as prizes and received from the sale of calves exhibited at livestock shows, provided a part of the \$2,500 required by the 4-H Club members for the purchase of their foundation herd. The balance of the sum needed was, through the assistance of Charles Osborn, manager and cashier of the institution, borrowed from the Winnemucca branch of the First National Bank of Nevada.
