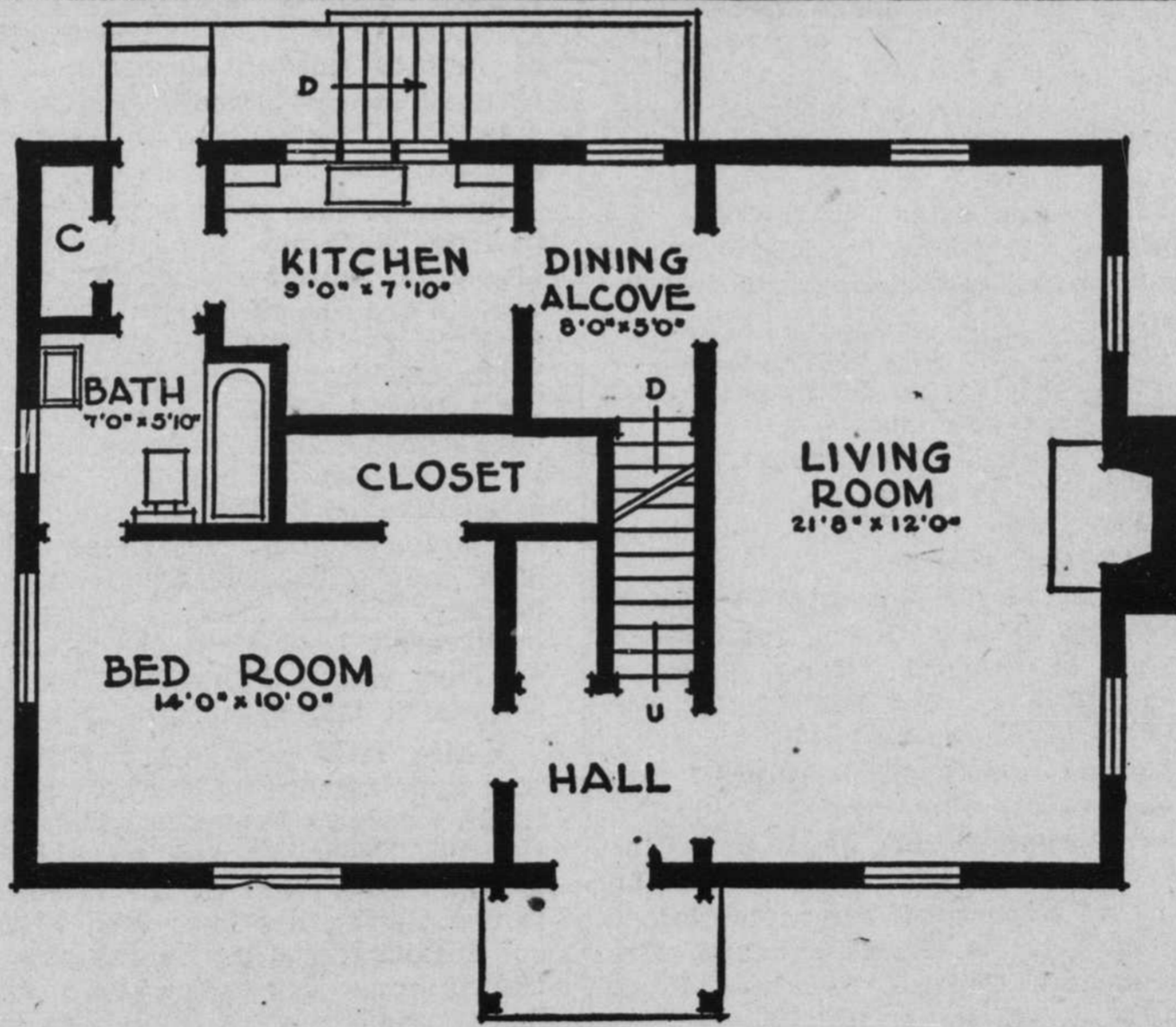

Stocker Fitted To Serve County

Harold Stocker, candidate for county commissioner, short term, to represent the northern district, was for many years a resident of Las Vegas. For the past five years he has been engaged in active business in the Moapa Valley and is well fitted by training and experience to serve his constituents as a member of the board.

Mr. Stocker has added greatly to the prosperity of the county by developing the silica sand industry near Overton. This business has contributed hundreds of thousands of dollars to the payrolls of the Moapa Valley region and is considered one of the stable and permanent enterprises. Its existence provides one of the important factors in securing the creation of Overton Power District No. 5 and the building of a Boulder Dam power transmission line into the valley.

Since he came to Clark County 27 years ago, Harold Stocker has been active in public life, although he never before was a candidate for a county office. His interest at this time is to assure a businesslike and economical administration of county affairs and such reduction in the tax burden as may be possible without serious impairment of the public service.

There are, perhaps, but few who remember that more than 18 years ago, in January, 1920, to be more exact, Harold Stocker accompanied Walker R. Young, who later became engineer of the Bureau of Reclamation in charge of construction of Boulder Dam, into Boulder Canyon (not Black Canyon), and helped prepare the base of operations from which the work of drilling the canyon in seeking the most suitable dam site was carried on.

Boulder Canyon was more than 44 miles from Las Vegas, in a region as nearly inaccessible as any in the Southwest, and it required real fortitude to reach it in the days before there were roads to follow.
