Considerable discussion was engaged in, during which Mr. Livingston stated that the funds available would suffice for but a very incomplete survey and report. The sense of the meeting was that State 'ngineer Smith and his acputy, Hugh Shamburger, advise wi h Mr. Livingston in making a decision as to what beneficial results can be ob-

Alfred Merrit Smith, state engineer and member of the Public Service and Colorado River commissions, accompanied by Hugh Shamburger, his assistant, and Charles DeArmond, member of the Colorado River commission, held a hearing this morning on the application of people of the Goodsprings-Yellow Pine district for permission to establish a power district under the law passed by the legislature in 1935.

Jay Smith, superintendent of the Chiquita mine; John A. Fredrickson and several others were present to make statements as to their need for power and the amount they would probably need at the beginning. W. H. Crozier and others were present in advisory capacities.

The meeting adjourned shortly after noon and the decision was taken under advisement.

SHIPPERS CAR LINE CORP., CARSON CITY. — Shattering all previous records for private placements in any one month, the Nevada employment service during July "brought the job and the worker together" 695 times, agency officials announced this week.

The figure, higher than any monthly total since the service was organized, bettered by 33 the former high mark of 662 private placements made in March of the present year.

The Reno office led the field with 332 placements, Ely was second with 101 and Las Vegas third with 93. Placements in other branch offices were as follows: Fallon 49, Elko 35, Lovelock 33, Pioche 23, Winnemucca 20 and Tonopah nine.

Total public placements made by the service during the month was 384. The Elko office led other offices with a total of 87 public placements, the Reno branch was second with 74 and Las Vegas was third with 53. Highway building and construction absorbed 189 of the placements scored.




