ELECTION BRINGS SURPRISES

The primary election Tuesday brought some surprising upsets in the political lineup of Nevada, most noticeable of which was the nomination by the Democrats of Judge E. P. Carville for governor by a vote of 12,184, to 9,546 for Harmon and 2,398 for Richards.

Senator P. A. McCarran scored an outstanding victory over the new deal stand-patters, beating his nearest opponent by a better than three to one vote. The figures with all but a few remote precincts in are:

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Prophesies New Depot For Vegas

Walter R. Bracken, speaking before the Rotary Club on the occasion of their last meeting in the Union Pacific dining room, in which the club has met for more than fifteen years, expressed the hope that the long deferred new Union Pacific depot at Las Vegas would be under construction before the end of this year.

Explaining that for the past year the Union Pacific eating house has been operated at a loss of more than \$300 per month, Mr. Bracken said:

"Since this building must be removed in the near future, the company has decided to discontinue operation of its dining room immediately.

"The money for construction of the new depot promised Las Vegas is in this year's budget. Had it not been for the vast amount of reconstruction caused by the floods of last spring, the new station would have been under way before this.

"It is my hope that construction will be begun before the end of the coming December in order that the appropriation for the work in this year's budget shall not lapse."

By this time next year I believe, Las Vegas will be proud of the fine new depot to be erected on this spot.
