Forest Ranger Anderson, under whose supervision the work of building camps and roads in the Charleston Park area, announces that the new Deer Creek road has been completed to the summit of the ridge and was thrown open to traffic last Sunday.

In celebra ion of the opening, Ranger Anderson has arranged for program at the Charleston Park Ranger station to begin at one o'clock Friday afternoon, September sixteenth. The public is invited to be present and the party will be onduc ed on what promises to be an interesting tour of inspection f the various projects carried on y the Forest Service in that area.

The new Deer Creek road which vill take the place of the road opened some ten years ago, was begun in the summer of 1936. It akes off from the paved Charleston Park highway about one and one-half miles above the former takeoff, and follows the side of the mountain at a high altitude. affording a mignificent outlook. It is said to be a high-gear road and its opening will greatly enhance he value of the Deer Creek egion for summer cabins. It is the rlan of the Forest Service to oil the new section next season, it is said.

The new Deer Creek road will be extended as fast as is feasible through Deer Creek and on to connect with the Lee Canyon highway, the pre'iminary survey and location for that work already having been done.

In addition to the new highway the Forest Service is building a telephone line from the Charleston Park line to Deer Creek, that part of the line now nearing comple ion. The line will be extended to Lee Canyon next year and will thus give quick communication to three wonderful and beautiful mountain areas tributary to Las Vegas and will stimulate the building of summer homes.

It is a most amazing thing that, less than one hour's drive from Las Vegas, we may reach the coolness of the high mountains in the midst of one of the most delightful scenic areas in the west.
