#### **Fulton Outlines Campaign Policy**

Saying that he is not a politician and that a busines-like administration of Nevada's affairs and not political considerations will be his real objective, if he is elected governor, John A. Fulton, Republican nominee for that office, outlined his position on public affairs in an address delivered before the Young Republican Club of Reno, Friday.

Outlines Platform

Harry E. Stewart, Republican nominee for congress and Charles Huber, Republican candidate for inspector of mines, also spoke briefly.

Addressing the meeting, which was largely attended by the club's members, Mr. Fulton outlined his position on public affairs substantially as follows:

Removal of all state departmen s from politics.

Solution of the Humboldt river

problem. A wise development of the state highway system.

Reorganization of the state high-

way system. Reorganization of the state highway department.

Maintenance of fair relations between employers and employes.

Collection of proper taxes from public unilities and a proper regulation of their rates, making due allowances for their capi al investments.

Protection of the state's railway system, particularly the short lines, in order to safeguard their employes,, the state's industries, and the state's tax structure.

Every encouragement to the state's livestock, mining and agricultural industries.

Power Utilization

Utilization of Boulder Dam power to the greatest extent possible.

Repeal of the present provisions requiring the taxation of intangibles, owing to the fact that legislation to that effect is non- enforceable.

Employment of Nevada citizens in Nevada jobs.

A wise administration of the old age pension system, consistent with the ability of the state to meet the required payments.

Mr. Fulton spoke in part as follows:

"Our Agricultural and stock iindustries must be fostered and safeguarded as much as possible, and our state rights protected from the encroachment of control by the federal government.

"Our educational system is of the greatest importance, and provision should be made to provide proper facilities where a careful study in dicates that this is neces ary.

#### Mining Industry

"The mining industry of the state is of paramount importance and the one which offers the best opportunity for expansion. The more prosperity and development which come to it is reflected directly in the prosperity of the state.

"The state analytical laboratory should be supported adequately because it enables prospectors, leasers and small miners to have assays and rock determinations made at no cost. In this way ore is found because of its unprepossessing appearance the prospectors would not feel justified in paying to have it assayed, even if he could afford it, which many cannot do.

"The state bureau of mines should

be supported and suitable provisions made so that competent full time men can be employed to help the prospectors and men and women operating small mines and leases and give them advice about the geoglogy, where to dig and so on. At the same time these men can collect data on mineral resources, methods of operation, etc. for distribution by means of pamphlets, letters and personal advice to men in other sections of the state who have similary problems.

**Boulder Dam** "The secondary mining schools and the traveling prospectors classes should be supported because they instruct the prospectors and leasers in the rudiments of mineralogy, geology, mining, milling, etc., whereas otherwise these men who need this knowledge badly would have no way of getting it.

"The utilization of Boulder Dam power is of great importance, primari'y because this use will develop industries of a permanent nature to quite an extent. Every possible effort should be made to develop this

"There are other important questions in the state which require careful study and anaylsis, but in a speech of this sort it is impossible to go into them all. There is, however, one other which should be touched upon and that is our favorable tay set up. This has re sulted in many people of means buy ing property here and becoming Ne vada citizens. This group is 'oyal

o the state and has an interest in fos ering its development. For these reasons legislation must be watched to make sure that this favorable position is not jeopardized in any way.

Jobs For Nevadans

"One piece of legislation which should be repealed in my opinion is the statute providing for the taxation of intangible assets. Similar statutes in other states have been found to be uninforceable.

"In closing, I wish to say that I believe Nevada jobs should go to Nevada citizens; I have always maintained this and I always shall." "My policy, if I am elected, wil. be to administer the affairs of the state in as sound a business ar engineering manner as I am cana

of doing. As I see the problem it is comparable to managing a large

mine. Heads of the various departments must be carefully chosen by the executive so that each head knows the business of his department thoroughly and so that the heads of all departments will cooperate and coordinate th ework so the whole operation will go on smoothly, efficiently and in the most economical manner.

Department Heads

"The real problem in getting any latge operation under way and working smoothly is that of selectin suitable persons to head the various departments. If I am elected governor of this state I shall select heads of departments because they are persons of the foregoing types and qualities first and for political expediency last.

"When a new manager takes over the management of a mine, he looks into the organization of the various departments carefully, and where such investigation indicates that reorganization of any of the departments is needed to insure the proper operation of the mine he does so as soon as possible without throwing the organization out of gear. The same thing applies to the state and this will be done if I am

Many Problems

"We have in this state a number of major problems still before us. One of the major ones is the Humboldt river. Enormous sums have been spent for engineering and legal fees in trying to arrive at a sa isfactory solution and it seems to me that now with the ground work laid we have a situation where good common sense applied equitably should go a long way toward solving the problem.

"Our highway system is another important one, particularly as regards feeder roads from mining and agricultural areas. A careful study of this problem should enable one to arrive at a sound conclusion as to where the available funds can be most usefully allocated for the development and relief of the different areas involved

"The highway department is one of the most important in the state as regards numbers employed and funds expended If I am elected governor I shall investigate the department thoroughly and have it reorganized so that it will be operated on the most efficient and economical lines possible. There are a great many competent persons employed by the department who will be retained for this reason and regardless of party affiliations, so that the depar ment wil operate
