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Rotary Hears Two Speakers

Las Vegas Rotary club, under leadership of Otto Underhill, program chairman for the day, carried out its program on International Service with two speakers.

Former Senator Tasker L. Oddie, honorary member of the Reno Rotary club, pointed out the large part Rotary International has played in the shaping of relations between the United States and other nations, citing by way of illustration the problems of providing international highways to facilitate communications between nations and also the large responsibility Rotary International has on the general subject of world peace.

Some years ago Senator Oddie said, "Reno Rotary Club of which he was a member, journeyed to Ely to assist in the organization of a new Rotary Club at Elko. At that time he had been appointed a delegate from the United States to the International conference at Rio de Janeiro.

At that conference in the course of his address, Senator Oddie proposed that the nations of North and South America should join in the great work of connecting the two continents by an International highway. The idea was taken up with enthusiasm by representatives of the Latin American nations and now, after great difficulties, the work is far advanced.

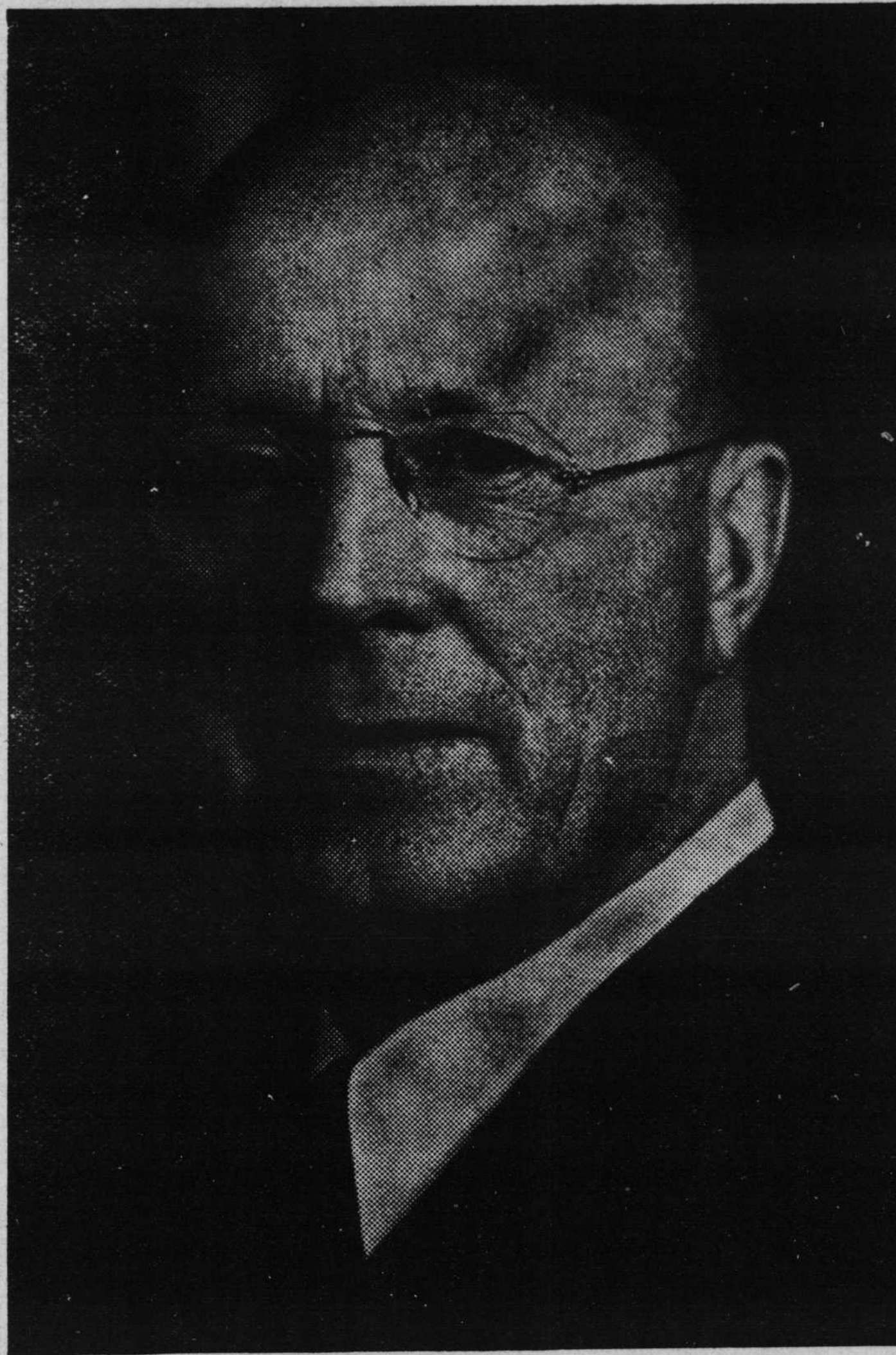
Before long the great highway will be ready for automobile traffic from Alaska in the far north, through Montana, Idaho, Nevada and California in the United States; down the length of Mexico; through Central America and the Isthmus of Panama; down the west coast of South America, thence across the Andes mountains into Argentine and Brazil.

"This highway already is a great factor in bringing the people of the various nations into closer relationship with each other. Las Vegas is fortunate that this International highway with its great possibilities for automobile traffic is routed through this city. It is happy to have been one of the earliest promoters of the enterprise and for many years have been active in this work which Rotary in Nevada set started."

Senator Oddie also gave an interesting account of his experiences when he was a delegate from the United States at an international Rotary conference at Shanghai, China, where seventeen great nations were represented, and declared: "I believe Rotary has been a great power in the settlement of the international complications
