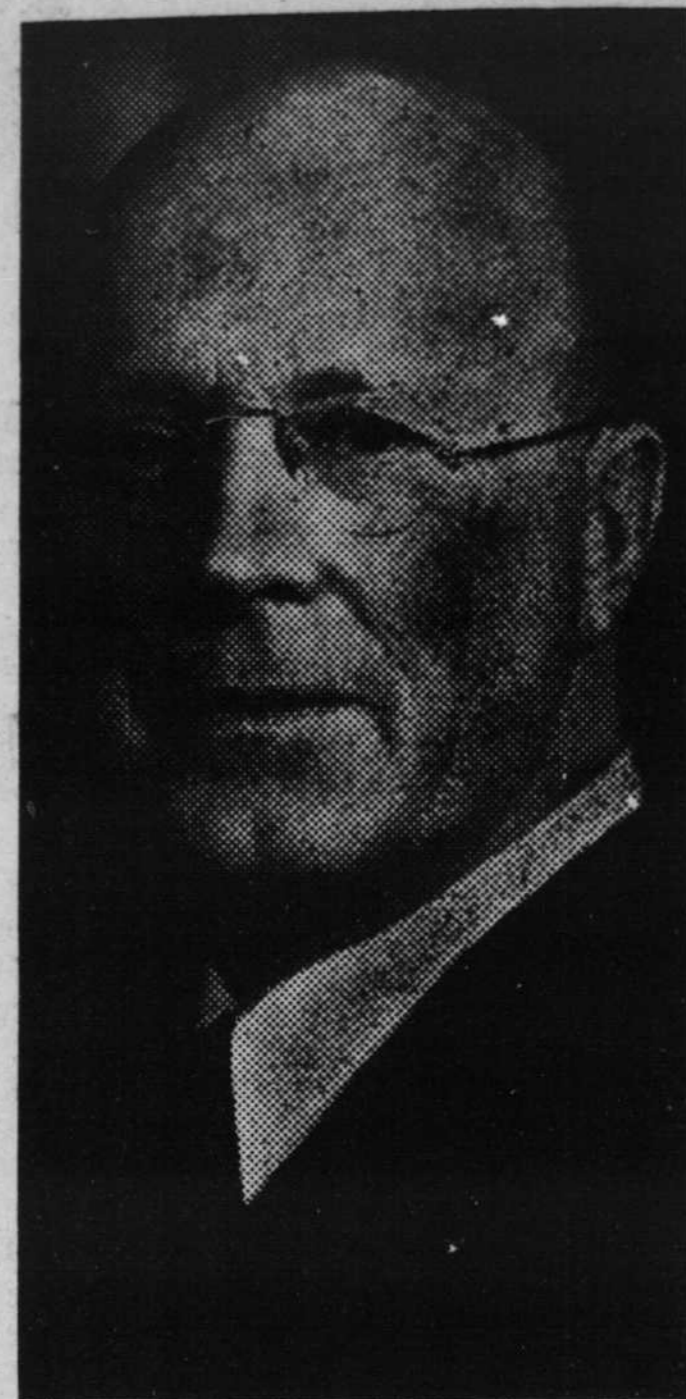


TASKER L.

Standing on a record of accomplishment and achievement for the State of Nevada, Tasker L. Oddie, United States Senator from Nevada during the 12-year period ending March 3, 1933, candidate for reelection on the Republican ticket, appeals to the voters of Nevada for their support and invites a careful study of his record.

In the present campaign he has no intention of attempting to detract from his opponent's record of his official activities and accomplishments in the Senate. He is entitled to the credit for what he has done.

The story has often been told of the famous prospector, Jim Butler, who discovered Tonopah, but to Tasker L. Oddie, one of his two partners, has gone a good part of the credit for the development and success of the Tonopah mines which have produced over one hundred and fifty million dollars in gold and silver and which awakened Nevada after years of mining inactivity. Oddie always takes pride in referring to his part-

ners in this enterprise. Jim Butler and Wilson Brougner, as men of the highest integrity and ability. They trusted him implicitly, and he did them, and turned over the management of the property to him. Rarely have men worked together in such harmony for such an important and far-reaching enterprise. These three men started this great mining camp with a capital of only twenty-five dollars. They endured hardships and worked hard under difficult conditions in bringing it to success.

One result of this has been the production and bringing into the State of hundreds of millions of dollars of new money from the mines, and of capital from other states for our enterprises; the employment of tens of thousands of men at high wages, the building of several hundred miles of railroads, the creation of many new industries and other benefits of high importance to the State.

Oddie had much to do with the development of Goldfield which added one hundred million dollars in gold to the wealth of the world, also of other mining camps of importance. He has spent millions of dollars which have come from the mines of Nevada, in the staking of prospectors and in the development of mining and other industries in the State. His activities and accomplishments are matters of history.
