First—Senator Oddie, fighting almost single handed against almost overwhelming odds, secured millions of dollars for highway construction which made it possible for Las Vegas and Clark county to build up their tourist travel to a height never before dreamed of.

Second—Working in perfect harmony with Senator Key Pittman and Congressman Sam Arentz, Senator Oddie was one of the outstanding leaders in the United States Senate in the formation and passing of the Boulder Canyon Project Act and was the outstanding figure in the Senate in securing the first appropriation of Ten Million Dollars for starting work on the dam. Many of the people of Clark county still remember that at the celebration of beginning work on the project after driving the "golden spike," the Secretary of the Interior stated that the main credit for the passing of the legislation and securing the appropriation for starting work on the dam was due to Senator Johnson and Congressman Phil Swing of California and Senators Oddie and Pittman and Congressman Arentz of Nevada.

Third—Securing the appropriation of \$200,000.00 for the federal building at Las Vegas as well as for those at Reno, Elko and Ely. Thanks to Senator Oddie's efforts Las Vegas has one of the finest federal buildings in the west.

These are only a few of the many accomplishments of Senator Oddie in the United States Senate, a complete list of which covering his long career of service would require many columns. And the people remember that these were "achievements which achieved." They were not the result of flowery oratory or high sounding phrases, but of sincere, tireless and practical efforts to serve his people, which have characterized Senator Oddie throughout his entire public career.

Drivers Warned About Licenses

CARSON CITY — Motorists who have failed to receive their certificates of registration or ownership from the Nevada Motor Vehicle De-

partment during the past year should communicate with the department immediately, prior to registration in 1939, Malcolm McEachin, secretary of state and motor vehicle commissioner, announced.

Several hundred certificates have been returned to the department by postal authorities, McEachin said, owing to faulty addresses or failure to leave forwarding addresses. Presentation of certificates is necessary for 1939 registrations, McEachin added.

Registration for 1939 will begin December 15.
