"Shortly thereafter, when the wagon load of food started for the gate, this crowd rushed toward it in a threatening manner and had I not outrun them to the wagon which I stopped, serious results and possible loss of life would have followed, as most of them were armed. I therefore saw for myself a vicious demonstration of violence and disregard of State Law, which was substantial reason for State intereference, I immediately telegraphed the State Police to come at once, to protect life and property, which were in danger.

"Later in the afternoon, a car load of armed guards was brought into the Smelter enclosure from Ely, by the mining company on its own volition entirely. That evening, when the armed crowd rushed the gate of the Smelture enclosure, two men were shot and killed, apparently by the Company's guards. I then declared marshal law in order to prevent further violence. The next evening the State Police arrived. My first order to them was to disarm the company guards, then those on the outside who were making trouble througout the district. Those orders were promptly obeyed. A settlement of the strike was soon made and the men returned to work and I was informed Las Vegas.

that both sides to the controversy were satisfied.

"I had nothing whatever to do with the controversy between the mining company and its employees and did not attempt to influence either side in the settlement. My sole purpose was to see that the laws of the State were enforced and that life and property were protected. I carried out my purpose as Governor and am proud of what I accomplished in this respect, and in maintaining the honor and dignity of our State. After the arrival of the State Police, not a man was hurt.

"The people of the Ely District have several times since this occurrence, twenty-six years ago, given me their support and confidence by helping to elect me United States Senator twice, and have thus approved of my official actions, as the records will show.

"It astonishes me to know that my opponent should falsify the facts and attempt to make political capital out of this serious incident which occurred twenty-six years ago.

"My labor record speaks for itself. I call it to the attention of the working men in the District, knowing that their judgment of me will be fair."


