- 3. He opposes these possible cuts, because the miners' families may be compelled to forego the purchasing of certain necessities of life.

## Great Meeting Held At Reno

RENO—Nov. 3—(Special) — John A. Fulton, Republican nominee for governor, Tuesday night pledged himself to take politics out of the state highway deportment, in an address at a Republican rally here, attended by more than 2,000 persons.

"I shall reorganize the highway department so that it will be operated on a business, and not a political basis. Employes will be selected for ability, regardless of party or other affiliations. Every effort will be made to give the axpayer the maximum return for his money," Fulton promised.

Smith drew applause when he announced that he would see to it that Nevada men get Nevada jobs if he is elected. He claimed that there are 400 non-residents working on Nevada projects, while many Nevadans are without work.
