New California Geologic Map

A large geologic map of California, measuring six and one-half feet by seven and one-half feet, has just been completed by the Geologic branch of the California Bureau of Mines under direction of Olaf P. Jenkins, chief geologist.

The map is lithographed in six colors and is drawn on a scale of one inch to eight miles. It has taken nine years to prepare, with the assistance of the federal government, many universities, various geological departments of scientific and commercial institutions, and hundreds of individual authorities.

The map is not only a valuable guide to industry and science, but will serve as an accurate guide to tourist travel and regional studies.

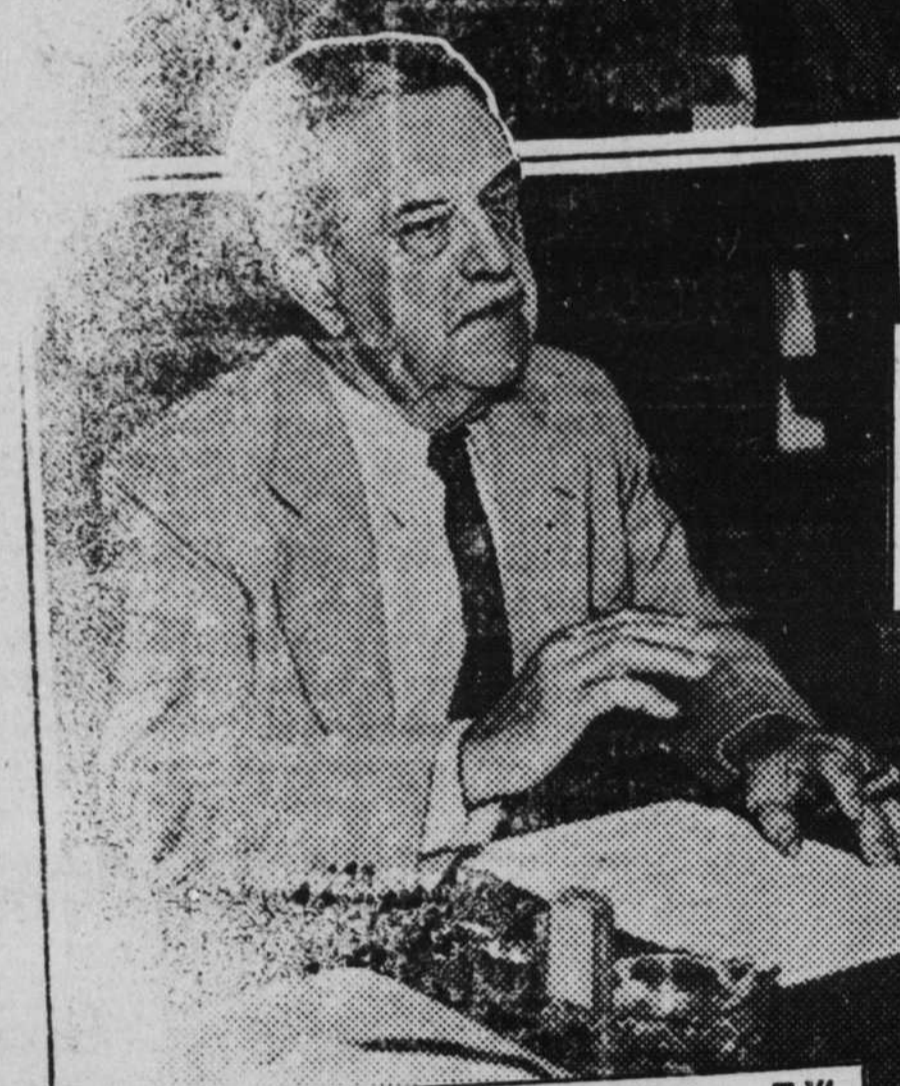
Sheriff Ward reports that he has not yet recaptured the two youths

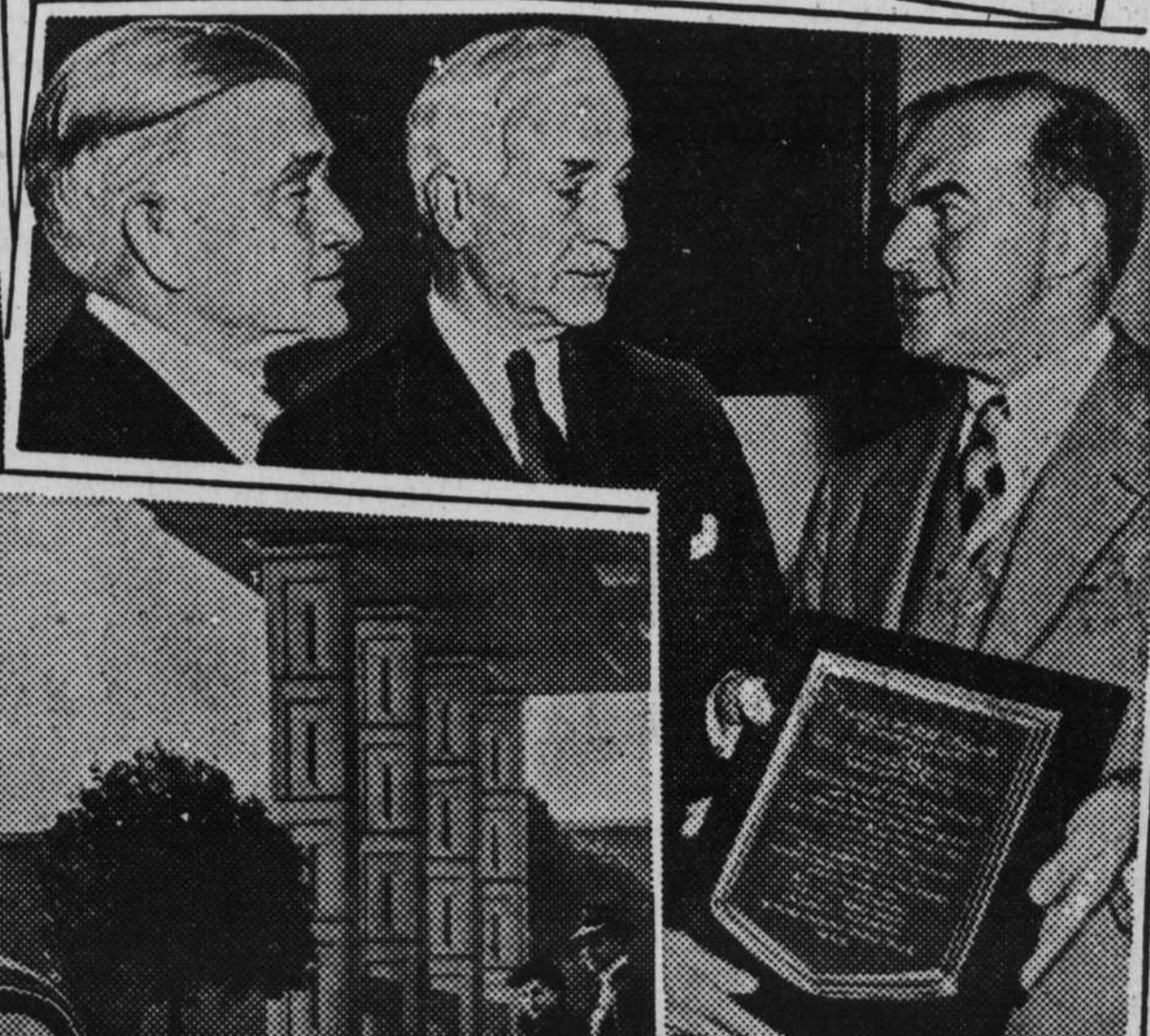

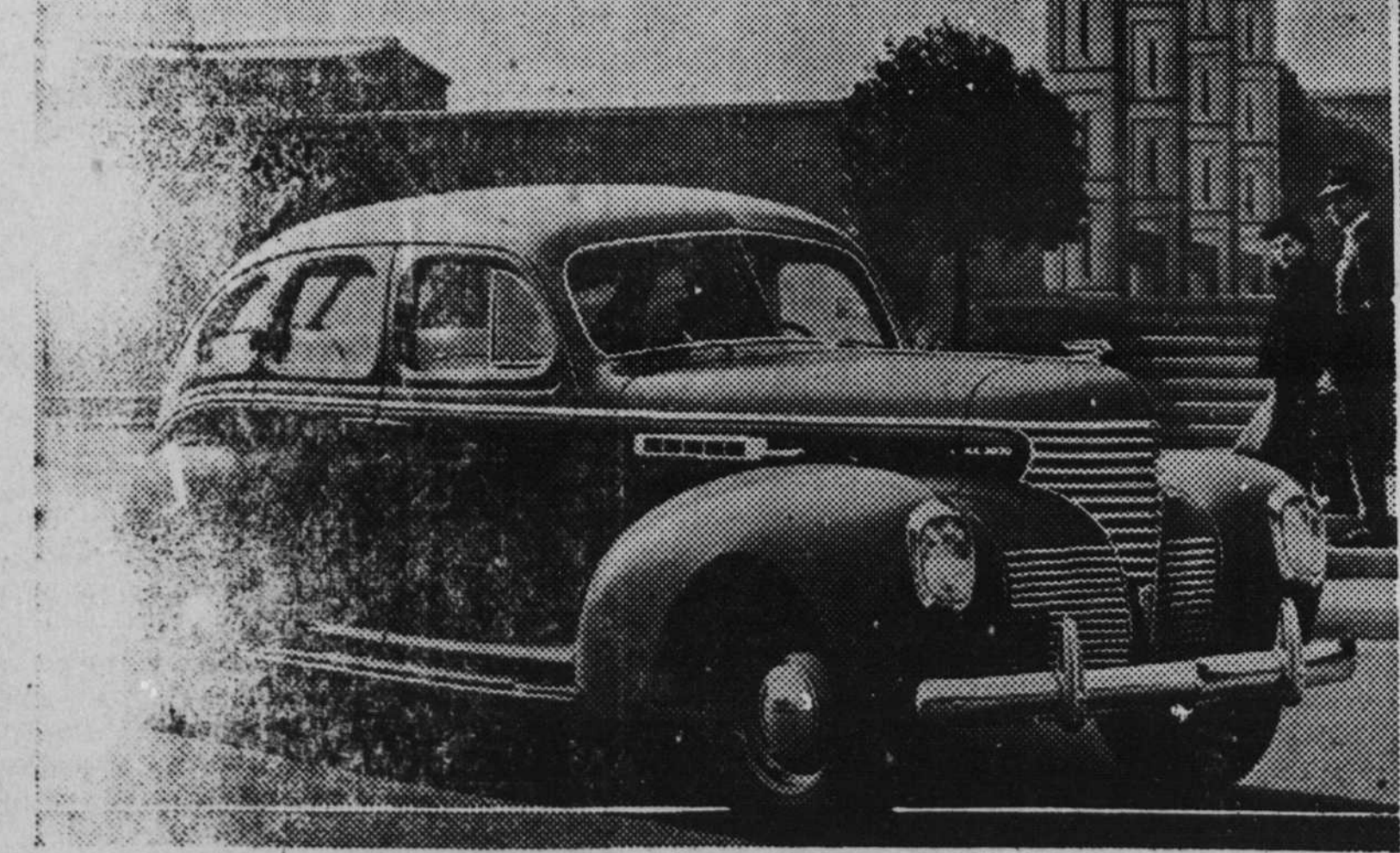
