### Antelope Given Christmas Bath

After exhaustive efforts for the past month the Mt. Charleston antelope, now reduced to a buck and a doe by tick ravages, were finally captured and given a bath.

This bath was in the form of a nicotine and sulphur solution, used to kill the antelope ticks which were all too plentiful on both animals and would likely have resulted in their deaths. The last casualties were attributed to this condition, although no ticks were known in the area prior to the transportation of these animals from northern Nevada.

These antelope, now about nine months old, are staying in the vicinity of the Kyle Canyon Ranger station, where local forest officers are feeding them grain and hay daily. The feed is furnished by the local Fish and Game association.

After being kept in "solitary" for 10 days, the antelope will be given a final bath to kill all tick eggs which may have hatched and then once more released on their own.

# Christmas Tree Cutting Banned

In response to the numerous inquiries regarding the cutting of Christmas trees on the National forest and other public lands in the vicinity of Las Vegas the following summation is made to guide those interested:

1. No cutting of Christmas trees will be allowed on the National forest for personal use or sale. Permits to cut trees for organizations, churches, schools, etc., will be issued free of charge. The permit must be obtained from the forest ranger, Room 301 of the Federal building, prior to cutting. Places for cutting will be designated. Upon a call to 914 for a tree for churches, etc., the permit will be mailed.

2. Mr. C. J. Allen of the U. S. Biological Survey in charge of the Sheep mountain area states that there will be no permits issued for that area so that no trees can be cut.

3. Trees may not be lawfully taken from any unpatented mining claims; neither can they be lawfully taken from private lands without the permission of the owner. Local officers who find local trees with

which no written permit from private owners of land, where the trees were taken, is found will take the necessary action. Be sure that you have these permits.

4. Applications for cutting and removal of Christmas trees from other federally-owned lands outside the boundaries of the National forest, and the Biological Survey refuges, should be made to Mr. N. F. Wadell, bureau of investigation, Salt Lake City, Utah. These permits should be obtained early, since considerable time will elapse before his type of permit will be issued.

The cutting of green trees on public lands, whether on National forest lands or not, without permits constitutes trespass, and persons found removing trees will be subject to trespass proceedings. Such trees may be classed as government property and possessed by the government for disposal to charitable institutions or for sale to the market.
