Hundreds Coming To Rotary Party

Several hundred Rotarians will be the guests of Boulder City and Las Vegas Saturday and Sunday, January 21 and 22, according to word received by Frank Gusewelle, chairman of the committee, from the Vernon, Calif., Rotary club which is sponsoring the event.

It was at first planned that the excursion should be confined to Rotarians of the 107th district, but many others have signified their desire to join.

An elaborate program has been prepared by Boulder City and Las Vegas for the entertainment of the visitors, including the following features:

Boulder dam: Conducted trip through center of the dam and the powerhouses.

Arizona lookout point: Bird's-eye view of the dam and lake, intake towers and spillways.

Arizona spillway: Stop for a closer inspection of the spillway, large enough to drop a four-story building through.

Nevada observation point for a view of Lake Mead and surrounding country.

Boat landing, Lake Mead, for a 50-mile boat trip on the lake through Boulder canyon and return.

Barbecue, old-time cowboy style, on the beach at Lake Mead.

National Park museum, at park headquarters in Boulder City.

Boulder City theatre: Continuous moving pictures of the construction of Boulder dam.

Lecture on the Boulder Dam Recreational area by Don Erskine, lecturer for the National Park service.

Automobile trips to scenic points in Boulder City and return trip to Las Vegas.

Dinner dance (informal) at Memorial building, Las Vegas.

Night life: Trips to the bright spots in Las Vegas, last of the Old West.
