Collier G. "Nick" Turner, Las Vegas High School grid star passed away Wednesday morning at 2:20 a. m. at the St. Vincent's Hospital in Los Angeles.

The management insisted upon, and the classification provided for, driving competitions, sometimes known as "wild driving." It was felt that this was the one type of draft competition that could thrill a horse show audience. Opposed to this school of thought, Osborne White and other leading breeder-exhibitors were not warranted in subjecting of big hitches , contended that they brood mares, to the hazards of "wild driving;" that it is not constructive to exact from a draft horse a pace foreign to this type. Result: The efforts of the opposition reduced the entries to numbers below the classification requirements, the management reluctantly called off driving stake nd eliminated the the draft horse entirely from the Horse Show program.

Draft horsemen, however, are undisturbed and are preparing for a brilliant Golden Gate Draft Hosre Show. The big steeds will occupy the Coliseum stage from July 10-24. # F. Bibb Speaks at Rotary Club

Announcing that exactly \$373,000 had been paid out in unemployment insurance benefits to unemployed workers of the State of Nevada during the period January 1 to June 10 of the present year, Forrest Bibb, employee of the Nevada unemployment compensation division appeared before the Las Vegas Rotary club yesterday to report on Accompanied by his brother, Ned the progress of the state law to

> In Clark county, Bibb said, 3,211 benefit checks have been received by eligible, unemployed workers, representing a total of \$38,272,09. In Las Vegas proper benefit claimants received a total of \$27,272.92. The average benefit check released in Clark county amounted to \$11.97 it was stated.

> Bibb also said that in the nation to date approximately \$582 millions of dollars have been paid out in unemployment insurance to the country's eligible jobless workers.

He added that all states, as well as three territories, have unemployment compensation laws and that all will be paying benefits under their law when Illinois and Montana start their benefit paying programs on July 1.

Tracing the organization of the division in Carson City, Bibb told his listeners that the agency was organized in 1937 and that payroll taxes were collected for a two year period and placed in a state unemployment insurance fund. January 1 of the present year payment of benefits began under the law the speaker explained.

Touching briefly on how employees were educated as to their rights under the law prior to the beginning of benefit payments Bib stressed the point that unemployed workers wishing to claim benefits must register at their local employment service office for a new job and there file their claim for unemployment insurance. Should a job to be found for the worker by the employment service he does not draw benefits, Bibb said, adding that if no job could be found the worker began drawing benefits, based on his previous earnings record, after serving a waiting period

The speaker urged employers to make use of the state employment service in the matter of securing qualified workers for part time or permanent jobs, pointing out that the employment service office often has many skilled workers who can be referred to a job requiring their services. He also pointed out that jobs are preferable to benefits and that when men are working the unemployment insurance fund is not

month of May the local employment service office had placed 183 workers in jobs.

Declaring that five persons have been convicted of making fraudulent benefit claims under the law to date, Bibb urged employers, employees and the general public at large to assist in policing the unemployment compensation fund to the end that only eligible workers draw benefits. He pointed out that not only does a false claim cheat an honest worker-it cheats the employer who pays the tax in that possible future rate reductions will depend on the stability of the insurance fund.

Railroad workers, Bibb gaid, will be transferred on July 1 to the Railroad Retirement Board, which after that date will administer its own employment compensation law for railway employees.

Covered under Nevada's law are approximately 30,000 workers, Bibb concluded.
