"This system of profit taking, by American dollar, the American

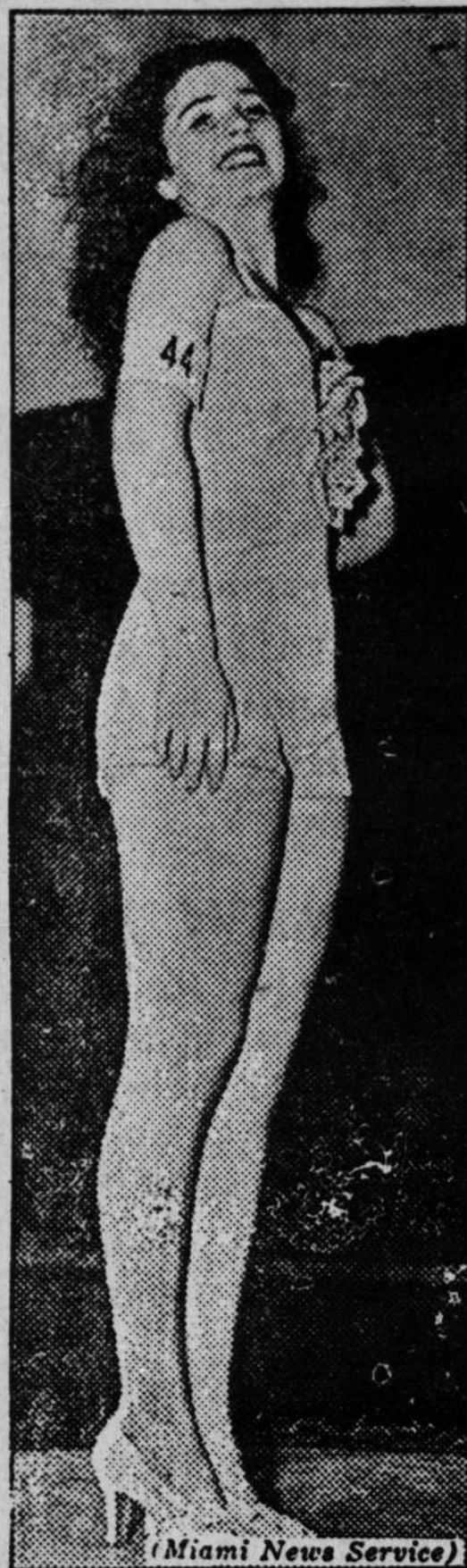
government thereby takes something from the American producer.

"The executive order fixing the price of American produced silver at 64.64 cents per ounce, takes from the American producer of sil-

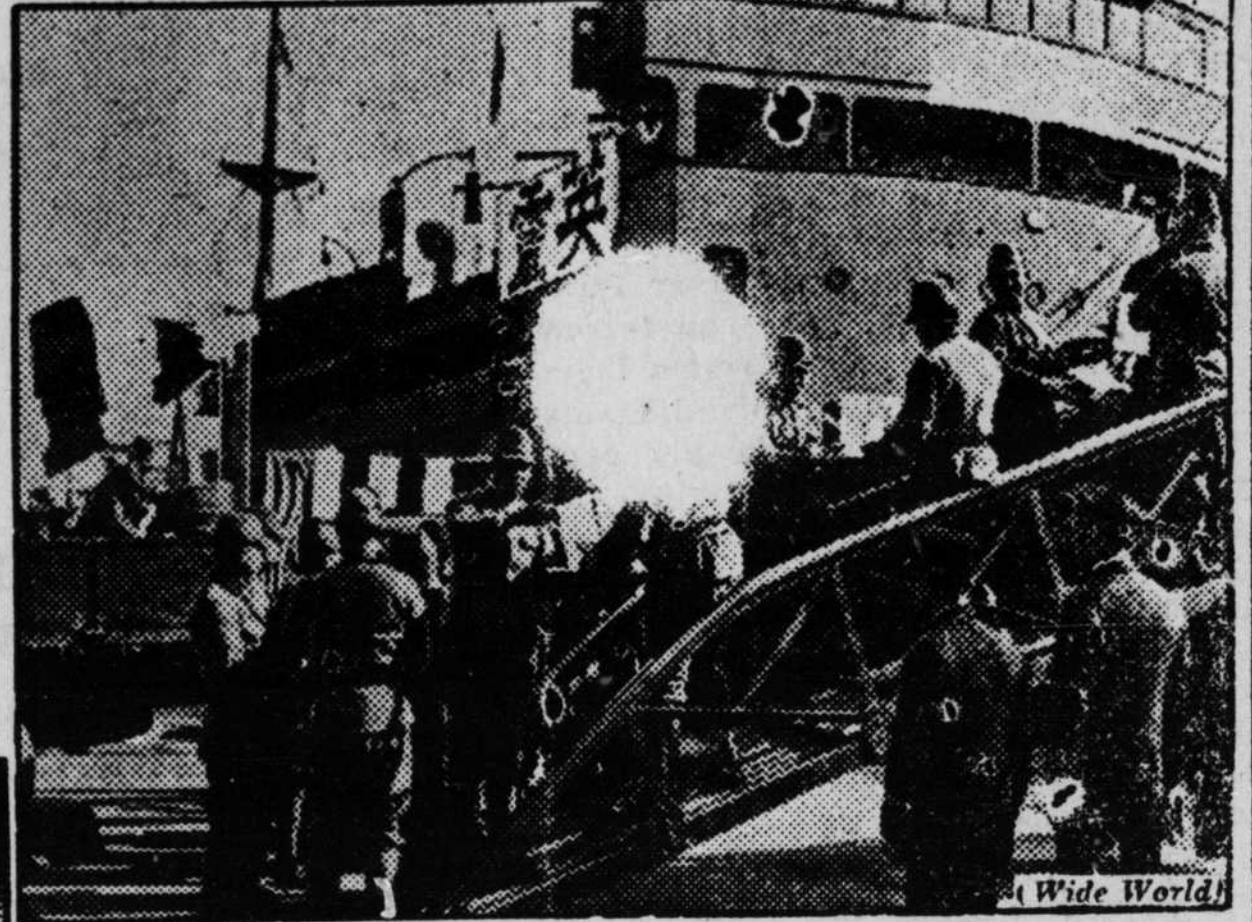

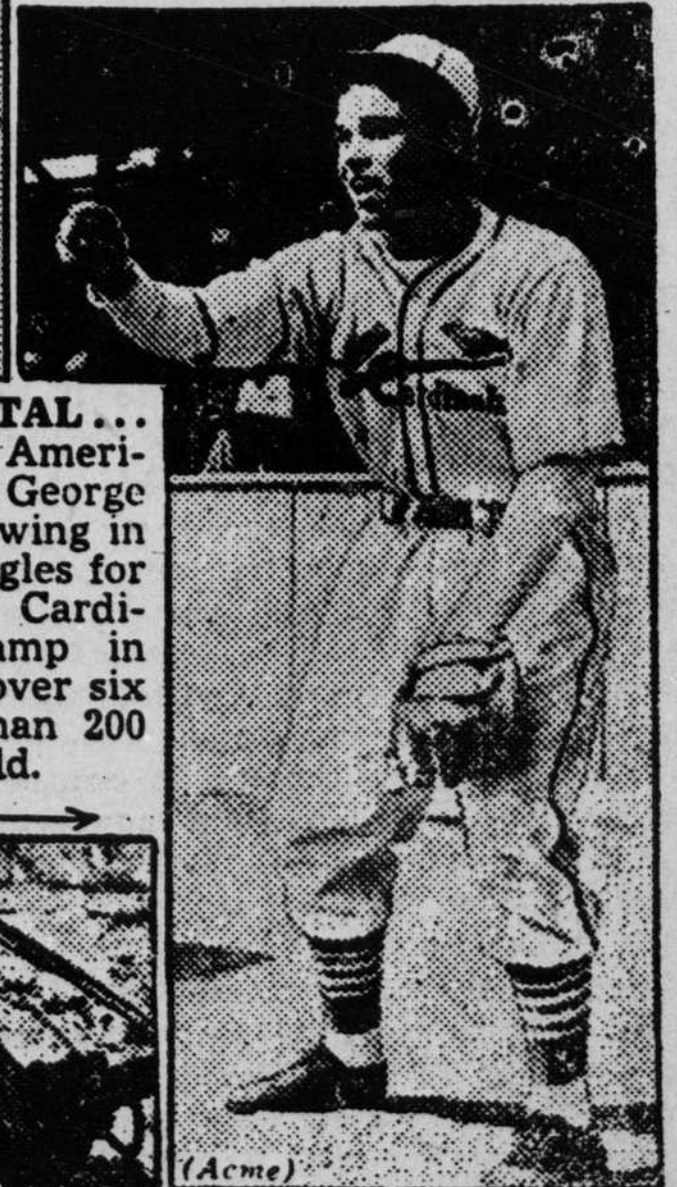
