Hints to Gardeners

Proper Watering

EACH year more and more gardeners are learning that gardens should not be watered by sprinkling. Sprinkling tends to moisten the surface soil only and thus encourages root growth at that point. When the root system is concentrated near the surface there is more danger of injury by hoeing; and if sprinkling is not done constantly plants will be quickly affected by drought. Much of the plant food to be absorbed by the roots is deeper in the soil, and if plants are induced by light sprinkling to root near the surface they may be partially starved.

Too frequent sprinkling is inadvisable also because it tends to promote mildew, a fungus disease which preys disastrously on several flower favorites, particularly zinnia. Considered from the time angle, sprinkling is impractical. It can safely be done only in the evening, as water sprinkled on foliage under a hot sun may lead to damaging scalding. There is, moreover, great waste of time in holding a hose and directing the spray.

The most efficient method of watering is to lay the hose on the ground, letting the water sink deep into the soil around the growing roots. Do not have too heavy a flow of water, or there will be a washing of soil and exposure of tender roots. Let the water run slowly in one place for 20 minutes to half an hour. Small channels may be traced to lead the water along the rows.

Where water connections are not available, gardens can be protected against drying out by maintaining a soil with good humus content. Humus tends to help the soil hold its moisture. Proper humus content may be gained by spading into the soil straw manure, peat moss, or lawn clippings from the compost heap.
