> ORDINANCE PASSED BARRING MINORS

Unanimously accepting an ordinance prohibiting minors from frequenting and entering saloons and bars, the Clark County commissioners acted last week following many complaints registered with them for restriction of juvenile activity. It will become effective September 21st.

The penalty for violation of the county ordinance states "any person who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon convicition thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00, or by imprisonment in the conuty jail for not less than 30 days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

The new ordinance provides that "it shall be unlawful for any person under the age of 21 years to enter or frequent any saloon, establishment or resort where spirituous, malt or fremented liquors or wines are sold, within the county of Clark, state of Nevada, outside the limits of any incorporated city or town.

"There are many statues along the boulevards and people seem to drive their automobiles by means of horns. Diaz, who did so much to develop Mexico, is not in good repute with the people, but Juarez stands well. We found also that the people still have great affection for the illfated Emperor Maximilian, whose palace, after being used by the rulers prior to Cardenas, is now being converted into a museum.

"There are ancient pyramids larger than those of Egypt although not so high and Paxco has been established as a region where change shall not be permitted, but everything remain as of old.

"Mexicans take their siesta regularly. Business houses generally close at one o'clock in the afternoon and reopen at 3:30. Judging by the heavy meals they eat this is a necessary custom.

"Among the most interesting things we saw were the native markets out on the sidewalks where everything is exposed for sale. I almost had to run away to avoid buying a live chicken from an insistent merchant," concluded Miss Frazier.
