over 500,000 tons, and it is now possible to secure frozen vegetables, fruits and berries in the dead of winter as fresh as when picked.

The plant will employ approximately 12 in the beginning and within a short time will employ from 250 to 300 persons. At the Cannery Convention in Chicago in 1936, Mr. Barnhill predicted that the vegetable juice industry would exceed in containers all canned vegetables within five years. The convention thought this very improbable but in 1939 they were beginning to change their minds as the demand during the term, especially during the past year, has been so great that Barnhill's prediction is not far off.
