New Appropriation For Exposition

Backed by an appropriation of \$350,000 by the State Legislature, bringing California's financial participation to nearly \$1,000,000, the 1940 season of the Golden Gate International Exposition will beyond doubt be the finest Fair the west has ever produced.
This was the unanimous opinion expressed by Exposition officials when appraised of the new appropriation.
Under the terms of the measure setting up the new finances, the sum of \$65,000 is set aside for special events.
"With this new appropriation added to funds remaining from last year's fund, Treasure Island is now in position to assure the creation of a host of new features," said President Marshall Dill.
"The commendable action of the Legislature in making this investment, which will be repaid many fold, will be of immeasurable benefit in many ways. The confidence of the State's lawmakers, as evidenced by their action, will prove a vital factor in securing many new exhibits, features and participants for the 1940 season."
