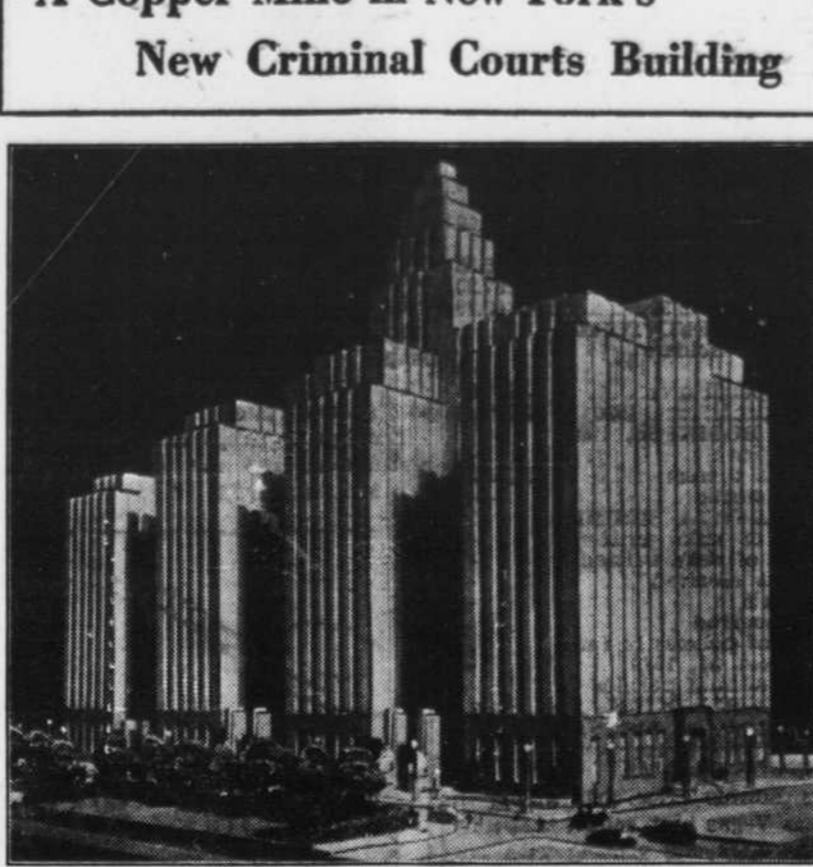

A Copper Mine in New York's New Criminal Courts Building



THE tonnage of copper and its alloys being used in the construction of the new \$17,000,000 Criminal Courts Building and City Prison located across the street from the famous Tombs, New York City, would make a small red metal mine. A total of more than 1,175,000 pounds will have been used when this monumental structure is completed. Here are a few statistics: 600,000 pounds of Brass Pipe for Plumbing. 350,000 pounds of Brass Pipe for Heating. 60,000 pounds of Lead-coated Copper for flashings. 265,000 pounds of Bronze for windows.

Findings Valuable To Nevada Farmers

Statistics of considerable value to the farmers of Nevada will be gathered next month in the Federal Farm and Ranch census of the state, Thomas Buckman, acting director of the University of Nevada Agricultural Extension Service, said this week.

When compiled and made available to the farmers, the figure may be used by them for various beneficial purposes, he stated, such as farm operations, planning, and marketing of agricultural products.

The information also will be helpful to the Federal agencies which work with farmers and ranchers.

Agricultural extension agents in the various counties of the state stand ready to help farmers prepare for the visit of the census taker, Buckman said.

It is advisable, he said, for each farmer to obtain a sample farm and ranch schedule from his agricultural extension agent as soon as possible and to fill out the blanks before the enumerator arrives. The census starts on April 1.

The visit to the enumerator can be very much shortened and the time of the farmer saved, he stated, if the needed facts and figures are ready well in advance of the census.

Spring Valley Region Uncover's Prehistoric Monster's Bones

Bones of a prehistoric monster, presumed to be a dinosaur, were uncovered last week in the southern part of Spring Valley north of Fortification mountain by CCC boys under the direction of Harry Oeters.

The bones were uncovered at a depth of approximately 10 feet while the boys, C. C. McAllister, George Smith, Jr., and T. Dominiski, were doing development work on Lost Springs. They reported that the formation showed the country had all been under water at one time, and that the low point in the valley where the bones were discovered, was probably the last sector to dry up. They said there was evidence of quicksand.

The bones were brought to Ely for display in downtown windows by Charles R. Pedler, range examiner. Some of them will be sent to the University of Nevada for possible identification.

Finds Conditions Show Improvement

General reports of an improving commercial, industrial and financial situation augur well for 1940," declared Harry J. Bauer, president of the Automobile Club of Southern California, in his annual report read at the recent directors' meeting at which he was re-elected to the presidency for the 11th consecutive year. "Throughout its career, club growth has been coincident with Southern California business conditions," the reports states. It recorded a net gain in membership 25

per cent greater than in 1938 and a total of 121,808 members at the end of 1939.
