### Strange Case

(Continued from Page One)

should be guilty of murder in the first degree, and that conclusion I deduce from the evidence introduced, and I believe that's your opinion, and that verdict should be arrived at very shortly after you retire for your deliberations. There shouldn't be any question in anyone's mind about that if you follow the instructions of the Court and if you feel inclined to do your duty the same as you would expect others to perform theirs in similar circumstances.

"As to the question of punishment, as indicated by the instruction of the Court, it is optional with the jury to give either life imprisonment or fix the penalty of death, and that's within your exclusive power. Whatever I may say on the subject you may disregard, as well as whatever Mr. McNamee may say on the subject. It will take a great deal of serious thinking on your part. As far as I am concerned if you bring in a first degree murder verdict, and if you feel the defendant should be sentenced by the judgment of the Court to life imprisonment, that's entirely satisfactory to me. I am not telling you what to do, and neither am I asking that you send the defendant to the gas house. In connection with that matter my own thoughts on the subject are these, that most people in the country today, and the best thinkers believe there is a little bit of good reasoning to the idea — the thought — that there may be some redemption in any man, no matter what he may do. Because of that fact I am not going to ask you here to send him to the gas house, but again I say the matter is entirely within your discretion and your power." Wiley concluded.

Probably the finest display of conduct during the entire trial was the Spartan attitude of Emanuel's mother, who throughout the proceedings manifested extreme self-control; while that of her defendant son was second only to hers.

Referred to as strange, it was that. But in a calm collected manner, which did credit to the judicial demeanor of the district court. It was strange because of the lack of theatricals; breakdowns, sideshow techniques and the complete desire of both prosecution and defense to out with the truth, and leave no issues clouded.

Yes, Las Vegas had a strange murder trial, but maybe it was strange only because the district attorney and the defense were agreed, that justice could be had in a simple and intelligent manner.
