Transportation Head Cuts Service

Office of Defense Transportation Director Eastman announced "no special train or bus service, including charter bus service, to football games or other sports events will be permitted. At the same time, I am directing that steps be taken by my office to prevent the overcrowding of regular trains serving areas in which such events are to be held." The Interstate Commerce Commission ruled that for the duration all railroads carriers may disregard any present regulations governing length of trains when necessary to assure prompt movement of freight or passengers.

The ODT ordered all operators of commercial rubber borne vehicles except motorcycles to carry and show a "certificate of necessity" in order to obtain gasoline, tires or other parts after November 15. The regulation covers almost 5,000,000 non-military trucks, 150,000 taxicabs and all ambulances and hearses.

Applications for certificates, as well as other pertinent information will be mailed about September 23, to all persons who registered last December 31, as owners of motor vehicles available for public rental.
