



State Will Supply Soldiers' Ballots

CARSON CITY, Sept. 30-Procedure for supplying ballots for the use of men and women ofevada serving in the land naval forces is now being completed by Secretary of State Malsolm Mc-Eachin in conformity with the recent act passed by Congress.

Applying for ballots will be made on forms provided by the Secretaries of War and of the Navy. According to information received in Carson City application forms have already been sent by air to army and navy bases in England and the south Pacific.

Applicants must be qualified to vote by reason of residence and age, McEachin declared, but the provisions of state law requiring registration will not apply to absent voters in the military services Member of the Constitution and nor will such voters be required

The act by Congress was intended to permit voting only for national offices, McEachin stated. but consultations with Attorney-General Mashburn have indicated Nevada laws in transmitting to qualified applicants a full ballot containing the names of state, county, and local candidates.
