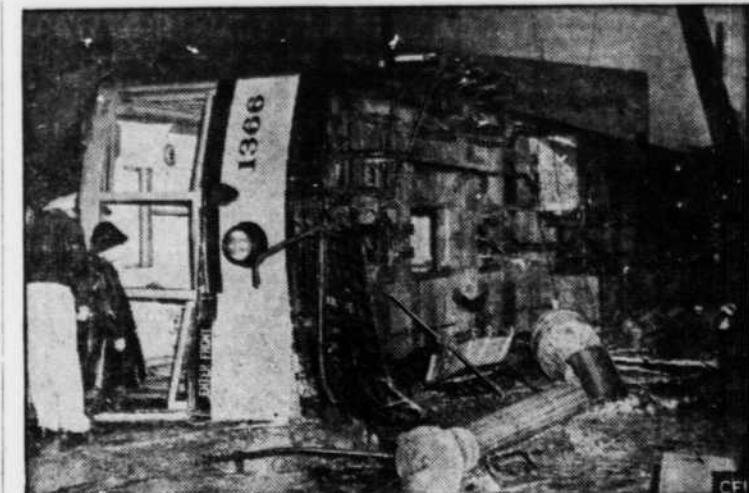

KAISER FIRM POURS IRON AT FONTANA

The 1200-ton blast furnace of Kaiser Company, Inc., Iron and Steel Division at Fontana, Calif., was formally placed in operation on December 30, making the first iron of the 600,000 tons of pig iron yearly which is the objective of Henry J. Kaiser, noted industrialist and head of company. Within several months, manufacture of rolled plate steel will be under way in the steel mill now under construction to handle pig iron from Fontana plant. Two shipyards operated by Kaiser, one at Richmond, Calif., and the other in Oregon, are expected greatly to increase their output of ships in 1943 with steel from Fontana plant. Ore for initial operation of blast furnace was brought to Fontana from eastern San Bernardino county.

Loan of \$27,000,000 to Kaiser Company for enlargement and completion of the steel mill at Fontana was recently approved by RFC.
