By ARTHUR N. SUVERKRUP United Press Staff Correspondent CARSON CITY, May 6 (UP)-Accidents took more Nevade lives during the first two months of 1944 than any other single couse, John Sullivan, head of the bureau of vital statistics, state health department, reports. A jump of 15 deaths due to

accidental causes was recorded over the similar period of 1943. Heart disease, always heretofore the principal killer, dropped to econd place, only 54 victims, 24 under the same period last

There was a decided drop in deaths, all causes, over the 1943 period, comparative figures show ing only 290 Nevadans succumbed the first two months of 1944 and 302 during the similar span in 1943.

Births continued to increase in the state with 53 more reported in January and February of this year than the same period of 1943.

Infant mortality also improved, only 26 children under one year succumbing in the two-month span; last year 33 during the same period.

There was not a single homicide in the state during January and February. In the same two

months of 1943 there were eight. Suicides also decreased, four persons ending their lives this year as compared with seven a year ago.


