Federal-State-local program to combat youth unemployment and juvenile delinquency in Los Angeles was announced by Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz recently.

Altogether, 4,100 youths will participate in the MDTA phase of the project. Of these, approximately 3,100 will take specific training courses to equip them for jobs. The others will be tested and counseled for referral to present work opportunities. Many will be given basic instruction in reading, and writing; others will receive instruction in English.

The project is primarily concentrated in two areas of the city- East and South-Central Los Angeles. The East Los Angeles. The East Los Angeles program, directed mainly toward Mexican-Americans, began last June and will provide training for approximately 1,500 youths, and guidance and counseling services for an additional 1,300.

THE SOUTH-CENTRAL program, dirprovide training, counseling, and placement services for 1,600 youths.

In addition, the Youth Opportunities Board will receive the first phase of a \$700,000 grant from the President's Committee on Juvenile Delinquency for a demonstration project in the prevention and control of juvenile crime.

Total MDTA and Juvenile Delinguency Act funds for the Los Angeles project. amount to approximately \$2.5 million.
