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# BEAUTY HINTS

THE APPEARANCE of any woman's hand and fingers, which is so important for today's fashion scene, can be beautifully enhanced by the look of long, elegant fingernails. Here are several tips, from a national beauty authority, on how to make them appear longer.

For all nails, long or short, the best way to color them and at the same time give them added protection is to first apply a clean nails.

Then, apply two or three coats of your favorite shade of nail satin. Finish with an application of top coat, which will protect the color, yet let its full brilliance show through.

TO GIVE YOUR NAILS the appearance of added length, apply polish to the entire nail -- do not leave a half-moon near the cuticle or a white rim at the end. In addition, keep cuticles pushed back each day with an orange stick or a towel, which can be done each time you wash your hands.

This exposes more nail length, and keeps cuticle under control. Square or blunt nails can be made to look more gracefully elongated and oval by leaving slight margins at the sides of the nails when applying the color.

Also, keep in mind that pastel shades make the nails look longer than do darker color. For your next manicure try the spring shades of Nail Satin called Sidewalk Cafes.
