ALLOT CENTER **FUNDS**

HOPES for the early construction of a community educational, health and welfare center in West Las Vegas have brightened with announcement that the government has granted \$30,024 to finance planning for such a project as part of a "slum reversal' program.

Allotment of the funds was made by the U. S. Department of Health and Welfare following a series of meetings between Sen. Alan Bible, Elaine Walbroeck, Reno, executive secretary of the Nevada Tuberculosis and Health Association, and department officials.

Two parcels of land amounting to one and one-third acres have been donated by the Clark County School District for the West Las Vegas center. They are between Owens and Harrison east of "F" St.


The "slum reversal" program has been dubbed "Operation Independence."

Swedes Favor US Negro

DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, who will be the featured speaker at the Freedom Fund Dinner at Las Vegas Convention Center, April 26, has been nominated for the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize by eight members of the Swedish Parliment.

In nominating Dr. King, the Swedish legislators paid tribute to the noted American theologian for successfully "keeping his followers to the principle of non-violence" as a leader in the civil rights movement.

"Without Dr. King's confirmed effectiveness . . . demonstrations and marches easily could have become violent and ended with the spilling of blood," the Swedish solons pointed out in making the recommendation.

Nobel prizes have been awarded annually since 1901 in five separate areas of human endeavor and carry a cash value of about \$50,000 each. The awards derive
