**CANNON SPONSORS STUDENT AI** 

WASHINGTON--Nevada Sen. Howard W. Cannon has cosponsored legislation to. authorize a comprehensive program of loans, scholarships and employment opportunities for students who otherwise would be unable to obtain a college education.

Cannon said enactment of the bill would be "one of the most significant steps ever taken to insure that capable students are not denied the opportunity for higher education because of their inability to meet the increasing financial burdens.

The bill calls for increases in longterm student loans, educational loan guarantees, a program of four-year undergraduate scholarships and a student workstudy program.

Cannon said the scholarships would be awarded by each state to entering college freshmen based on financial need of the recipient and his academic promise. The scholarships could not exceed \$1,000 for an academic year.

The loan guarantee program to be established by the bill would insure college and commercial loans negotiated by college students. The loans would be repayable over a 10-year period following graduation.

Cannon said the student work-study program would be limited to students in need of employment income to pursue a full-time course of study. He said the employment would be directed entirely at programs involving substantial public service or educational content, including teaching, research and community welfare training.

DR. RALPH BUNCHE, noted for his work for the United Nations, was the first Negro to receive the coveted Nobel Peace Prize. Dr. Bunche was the 1950 winner. Other distinguished Americans so honored were Presidents Theodore Roosevelt (1906) and Woodrow Wilson (1919); Vice President Charles Dawes (1925), and Secretaries-of State Elihu Root (1912), Frank Kellogg (1929), Cordell Hull (1945) and Gen George Marshall (1953).

Dr. King's appearance here on April 26 for the Freedom Fund Dinner at the convention center will mark the distinguished Georgian's first speaking engagement in Las Vegas. Those intending to attend the dinner are advised to obtain tickets early as a sell-out is anticipated.

The giant rally, sponsored by the local NAACP chapter headed by the Rev. Marion Bennett, is chairmaned by Robert Bailey and James Anderson. Earl White is coordinator. Gwen Weekes and Eugene Murphy are co-chairmen of the Ticket Committee that includes Eileen Brookman, Al Bramlet and Flora Dungan.
