George was the first husband of the late Dinah Washington. He played a major part in moulding Dinah into the role of "The Queen", a title she held for many years. Although Dinah Washington had been gifted with great natural talent, she probably would not have reached top stardom without George's tutoring and influence.

George has one son by Dinah who is making a name for himself in show business. George Jenkins, Jr., should make rapid strides. He has an excellent musical heritage from illustrious parents.

The George Jenkins Trio features John Lemon, of the Frankie Laine group on tenor and flute, and Jimmy Scott on organ. THIS TRIO has a flexible repetroire that ranges from Dixieland to progressive. It can be heard and enjoyed at Ruben's West Owens nightery from Tuesday through

Sunday. Co-owner Woodrow Wilson is flashing a smile that rivals the lights on Fremont Street. Woodie is jubilant about the great number of Jenkins fans who have been turning out to catch George's crazy beats.
