But March finally heeded that old saying about "going out like a lamb" and large hauls of crappie, bass and trout were reported last Saturday and Sunday on the lake and down the Colorado.

With milder weather approaching, this would seem a good time to caution all boaters on the lake to beware of the dangerous reefs resulting from the low water level. A lot of you who haven't been out over the winter should be doubly wary and stay as close to the channel as possible en route up-lake. And when you near your favorite fishing spots, be sure you "slow down to a walk" in shallower waters.


It was with considerable relief that we learned that Secretary of the Interior Udall has ordered the custodians of Glen Canyon Dam to open its gates so that Lake Mead can at least maintain its present level.

Here are a few tips on how to improve your "luck" this spring:

Snip small bits of fluorescent yarn and tie them to the hook eyes or attach to the lure body with a dab of fingernail polish to make your bait hooks and lures more attractive to the finny folk. Gay colors are effective for deep or muddy water and dark gloomy days. OTAL CALL

When using worms for bait, many anglers make the mistake of hooking them through the thick ring just below the head. The worm's vital organs are in this region so if you hook them below this ring they will stay alive longer.

After cleaning your fish, have you found it difficult to get the odor off your hands? It's not easy to do, even with strong soap. But toothpaste will get the job done nicely and you don't have to use a fluoride. Just wash your hands with it. It doesn't take much.


