ORGANIZING WORK CENTERS

KITCHEN WORK CENTERS are arranged with the idea that all equipment for a task should be in one area. A re-



ceiving center for supplies should be close to the refrigerator and other storage space. Utensils and supplies for preparing a meal should be stored near the work surfaces where they are to be used in cooking, and those surfaces should be next to the range, making a meal-preparation unit. The sink is the cen-

ter of the cleaning-up

unit. The serving space and table for eating make another center. Organization into well-equipped centers results in simplification of the work to be done in the kitchen, shortening the time and reducing the labor.

Regardless of the size and shape of a kitchen or of the simplicity of its equipment, its arrangement into well-organized work centers is important.

FOOD RECEIVING, STORAGE CENTER

FOOD IS RECEIVED, sorted, cared for, and as far as possible, stored in this center. Some provisions go to the sink for care and are then placed in the refrigerator. Ohter items may be stored in cabinets, in the home freezer, or in the pantry.

If the center is carefully arranged and equipped, a minimum number of steps will be taken in going from the counter or table for sorting, to the sink for washing and to the refrigerator and other storage areas. A wheeled cart or trays will save many steps.


THERE IS BIG NEWS this spring, for the waist has moved low, down to mid-hip, so the peppiest, prettiest outfits for the fun and sun days tell us.
