SAWYER PRAISES JFK "RIGHTS" EFFORTS

Remarks made by Governor Grant Sawyer at the John F. Kennedy Memorial Observance and Community Breakfast at the Carson City Nugget last Friday:

MANKIND HAS LABORED since the dawn of civilization to perpetuate the words and deeds of those who have, in every age, altered the course of human events. In classic sculpture and dramatic paintings, in lofty oratory and disciplined prose, the actions of the great and near great have been memorialized.

Many who would seize the mantle of greatness have been found wanting. It is altogether fitting that history has rendered a ruthless and impartial judgment on the motives and ultimate accomplishments of those who would influence the destiny of civilization. The despots and warlords of the Age of Caesars are not half so remembered, nor was their legacy half so enduring, as that bequeathed by the philosophers and statesmen of the Age of Reason.

History will make a similar judgment on the age in which we live. The tyrants of our modern world... the 20th century Caesars who would deprive man of basic freedoms and enslave whole nations... will not be half so remembered as the courageous men who defended, with blood when necessary, the ideal of democracy.

We are gathered this morning to honor the memory of a man who dedicated his life to the preservation of this ideal... John Fitzgerald Kennedy, the thirty-fifth President of the United States.

Had he lived, he would have observed his 47th birthday today. That he did not live is one of the profound tragedies of our time, for he was a gifted human being whose leadership in the struggle for lasting peace and human dignity provided a well of inspiration to free men in every corner of the world.

We cannot begin here to describe the depth of his greatness. Words are wholly inadequate to summarize the achievements of a man who in three short years did more to advance the cause of equality than had been done in the entire history of our nation.

THE MOST ENDURING MEMORIAL to the late President will not be an impressive monument, though many may be built, nor will it be an inspiring eulogy, though many have been read.

The most lasting memorial will be provided by the American people and their Congress... the completion of the work he was unable to finish, particularly in the field of civil rights.

I can think of no finer tribute to John F. Kennedy than the permanent guarantee of equality to (see "SAWYER" page 12)
