

The pledge which Montgomery county resi-dents were asked to sign says: "I believe that every person has the moral right to purchase or rent a home anywhere with-out regard to race, religion or hational origin. I urge financial institutions, home builders, apartment owners, and real estate brokers to do business without discrimination."


