BARING'S CHANCES FADE IN REELECTION BID CARRON ARROUNCES

Second Term

SEN, HOWARD W. CANNON today formally

announced his candidacy for a second term as
United States Senator from Nevada.

Declaring that he had "voted in what I believe to be the best interests of Nevadans and
Americans many hundreds of times," Cannon

Since his election, Cannon has amassed seniority in the Senate on such vital committees as Armed Services and Space. He also holds membership on the Commerce Committee, Rules, and several key subcommittees, including Aviation and Surface Transportation. He currently is Chairman of the Privileges and Elections Subcommittee, a post he will temporarily resign during his re-election bid.

Cannon described himself as a Democrat who embraced the progressive and moderate approach of his party and continued:

"I am proud to call myself a Democrat associated with the progressive and moderate approach of my party in the belief that such policies provide the best avenue through which we can work together for a greater future for ourselves and our families."


In his statement of candidacy, the Senator said: "No one could ask for a higher honor than representing a great state like Nevada.'

DENTON STOCK N CONGRESS

WALTER BARING'S involuntary retirement as United States Congressman from Nevada was practically assured during the past week with the withdrawal of City Commissioner Ed Fountain from the race for the Democratic nomi-nation for the state's lone seat in the House of Representatives.

Fountain's decision left County Commission-er Ralph Denton as Baring's sole rival for the Democratic nomination. As in many Southern states, victory in the Democratic primary will be tantamount to election due to the top-heavy preponderance of registered Democrats over Republicans in Nevada.

In a head-to -head battle between Denton, who may be loosely classified as a moderate progressive, and the reactionary Baring, there seems little doubt as to whom the Democratic voters in this state will select to represent them in the so-called lower house of the national

Congress.

IT IS DEVOUTLY HOPED, therefore, that no other person eager to rid Nevada of the Baring blight on the body politic will come forward to challenge Denton for the right to oppose the incumbent before the deadline for filing on July

As far as the Negro voter is concerned, the issue is clearly defined. Denton should receive the solid support of every Negro voter in Nevada regardless of party. A vote for Baring would be suicidal--a virtual self-inflicted stab in the
