A MAN CAN GROW

Text: And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper. Psalm 1:3

The purpose of this sermon is to stimulate our aspirations for

our aspirations for personal growth, growth in spiritual personality.

"Grow" is a magic word. By growth we have the beauty of a garden, the fruitfulness of an orchard, the recovery of a mountainside once devastated by fire, the achievement of fine human personality. "Can" is a royal

word. Thomas Carlyle discovered that "can"

and "king come from the same root. The king is the man who is able, the man who can.

"Man" is a personal word. A man is a person
--you--me. "Growth is a process always affecting individual units, that is, the cell grows,
the planet grows, the boy grows, each grows as
a separate and individual person," according
to Carlyle.

What is the Secret of Growth? Hunger is the secret of growth. Every growing thing is a hungry thing. If you are not hungry, you will not eat—you will not grow.

Biological growth is involuntary. Spiritual growth is by free choice.

The growing edge or growing points of a plant are often to be found in the roots. Each plant grows as its hunger sends out roots to provide its nourishment. We can all see the

provide its nourishment. We can all see the analogy in this. Paul writes of being rooted and grounded in love.

Roots we must all have. Why not put the roots down into the best? Root the soul in love, in wisdom, in the character and love and grace of God as revealed in Christ. Become hungry for the best and let that hunger send out your growing edge for nourishment. You will grow.

What is the process of growth? Suppose that you plant an acorn with the expectation that it will germinate, sprout and grow into an oak. You become interested in the process and so every day you dig up the acorn to see how it is growing. Naturally, we know that is disastrous.

Toward the process of growth interference is often unwise; noninterference is wise.

The growth of an acorn into an oak is largely an unknown process. As mysterious as is the

an unknown process. As mysterious as is the acorn itself in that it holds within itself a great oak tree.

If we are to grow, we must help others to grow. No man can grow by himself. The acorn that grew into a large oak did not grow by itself. If it were possible for the acorn to speak for itself, it would tell you that the wind, rain and sunshine all contributed to its growth.

The Results of Growth. I think that Jesus' life would be the best illustration for the results

His coming was a tiny event in a brawling world. His birth was all but overlooked in the noisy problems of the day. The people of Bethlehem worried about bigger things than the birth of a baby—the oppression of the government, the high taxes, the movements of the military, the condition of business, and the price of food. These were the big and important things. The people would have laughed at the idea that a babe in their midst was to become Saviour of the world. They would have sneered if someone had told them that the spiritual power he represented was more important and lasting than all their glittering civilization. Even as a carpenter and teacher Jesus was unknown and ignored by those in power. In the end he was ridiculed and crucified by them. Yet out from that obscure life has come an influence that has changed the face. of the world. The least of the seeds has become the greatest of the herbs.
