ful public demonstrations, to urge repeal of such laws or to effect change of such customs.

"If and when the means of legal recourse have been exhausted or have been demonstrably inadequate, Christians may then choose to serve the cause of racial justice by disobeying a law that clearly involves the violation of their obligations as Christians.'

The statement said that persons engaging in civil disobedience should direct their protest against a specific grievance or injustice; carry it out in a non-violent responsible manner and accept the penalty for their action.

The statement also prohibited racial discrimination within the church; called for inlation of programs supporting Christian fellowship; lobbying for enactment and enforcement of legislation guaranteeing equal rights in all areas to all persons without regard to race.
