GOLDWATER NOMINATION BITTERLY CONDEMNED BY NATIONAL NEGRO LEADERS

NEW KAPPA CHAPTER LAUNCHES PROGRAM

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SENATE SEEKERS INVITED TO TALK HERE TOMORROW

BROAD COMMUNITY SUPPORT among Democratic voters for the Rev. Leo A. Johnson in his bid for a seat in the Nevada State Assembly was evident this week following his decisive victory last Friday in an open caucus of West Las Vegas citizens.

The caucus was called by Nevada Voters League president Charles L. Kellar to launch a unified drive to send at least one Negro to

Carson City to serve as a spokesman for the colored people of Nevada in the State Legislature.

Rev. Johnson, pastor of St. Peter Baptist Church at "C" and Washington Sts. in West Las Vegas, received more than twice the combined number of votes accorded two other Negroes who filed for the Assembly on the Democratic ticket. Joe Neal, an employee of a Henderson industrial plant, received one-fourth of the votes cast. Mrs. Autumn C. Keyes, a West Las Vegas housewife, ran third among those who expressed a choice at the open meeting held at 1400 North

A fourth Negro resident of West Las Vegas, the Rev. Donald M. Clark, has filed for the As-sembly in the same District (No. 2, Las Vegas Goodsprings) on the Republican ticket along with six others. Eight Democrats and eight Republicans are entitled to contend for Assembly seats from District No. 2 in the general election on Nov. 3, so Rev. Clark faces no contest for a place on the final ballot in the primary election of Sept. 1.

In addition to Rev. Johnson, Neal and Mrs. Keyes, there are 23 other Democrats seeking one of the eight spots allotted their party in the (See SENATE, page 19)

Dr. King Declares Barry Fosters Racist Philosophy

SPOKESMEN for the nation's 20 million Negroes reacted with bitterness to Senator Barry Goldwater's nomination as the Republican candidate for President.

Despite the Arizona Senator's frequent statements that, if elected, he will uphold the law, many civil rights leaders predicted trouble for Negroes if Goldwater is elected.

Several accused him of making insincere

statements to win you

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, said that although he did not regard Sen-ator Goldwater as a racist, the Senator "articulates a philosophy which gives aid and comfort to the racists."

"I think that it's obviously an attempt to appeal to all of the fearful, the insecure, preju-diced people in our society," said Whitney M.

Young, director of the National Urban League.

"It's a test of all Americans, whether they really believe in democracy, in sharing, in civil rights for all people. This whole campaign is based on the notion that most Americans aren't
