Thursday, July 30, 1964 MULLEN NAMED FOR HIGH HONOR BY L.V. JAYCEES

ROBERT E. MULLEN, who this year became the first Negro to receive the Distinguished Service Award of the Las Vegas Junior Chamber of Commerce, has been nominated for national honors by the local Jaycees.

Mullen, chief juvenile probation officer for Clark County since November of 1963, has been designated a candidate for one of the 10 Outstanding Young Men of America awards given annually by the national Jaycees to worthy citi-zens between the ages of 21 and 35 years. Better known as "Moon" to his many friends in the community, Mullen is 33 and has been a resident of Las Vegas since 1953. He is a native of Hactings, Nah

of Hastings, Neb.

Mullen's career will be outlined in the Outstanding Young Men of America Annual according to Doug Blankenship, chairman of the yearly publication's board of editors. Introductory articles for the annual are being prepared by President Lyndon B. Johnson and United States Jaycee President Richard Headlee.

From 1953 through 1959 Mullen was chief of security at a local casino. From 1959 to 1961 he was a Deputy Sheriff of Clark County. He became deputy probation officer of the county in April of 1961 and remained at that post until his present appointment.

A GRADUATE of Hastings High School, Mullen attends the University of Nevada at Las Vegas on a part-time basis and has specifically been interested in courses on alcoholism, political science and psychology. He has also taken correspondence courses from LaSalle University of Chicago in an effort to learn more about his profession.

A dedicated friend of youth, Mullen just completed a manual on policies and procedures for probation officers and is currently looking for a publisher.

Mullen served with the U.S. Army combat engineers during the Korean conflict, and atten-ded the NSO Military Leadership School at Ft. Leonard Wood and Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, Ga. He won the Far Eastern Com-pany medal with Oak Leaf Cluster.

IN ADDITION to his official duties Mullen serves as treasurer of the Nevada Council on Crime and Delinquency and the Board of Directors, Governor's Committee on Alcohol Studies. He has been a member of the Clark County Democratic Central Committee since 1958, but has never held political office.


