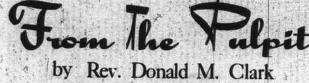

Text: "Moses my servant is dead; Now therefore arise, go over this Jordan, thou, and all this people, unto the land which I do give to them, even to the children of Israel." Josh. 1:2. The man who lives with God face to face can

his influence go out Rev. D.M. Clark to the ends of the earth, but his physical life, his day-to-day leadership, was no more. How true it is that the only time we possess

is "now"!

We think of God as belonging to the past. His unfolding revelation belongs to history. We can rest our weary minds on the way God has guided us, never so firmly as when we least expected it. We look forward to greater blessings from the hand of God. Our vision is an incentive, our dream a provocation.

Looking back and looking forward! Both have great truths in them, but "now" is the essen-tial truth. The Bible from cover to cover is a "now" book. As it unfolds, we feel the power and might of God in every situation. God is the

great contemporary of man. It is out of the "now" that feelings of com-pulsion and a sense of authority come. When we seek to do the will of God in our present situation there is always a "therefore" after

the "now". "Therefore" means that there is a purpose

in all events: cause, effect, and end are in be-ginning, growing, learning, and maturing. Far too many people today have lost sight of "therefore". They see life only as a gamble with luck as the cheeky goddess. They fight shy of the discipline of the well-regulated pattern. What they do not like they call drudgery, and what they like they call pleasure. They deny themselves the whole realm of joy, the fruits of the spirit.

If we choose to accept God's "therefore" we should do it with our eyes wide open. There are the broad fields and the wide roads of looking after yourself. But Jesus calls us to something more worthwhile, and more restrictive: A way of life with truth shining in it. He warns

A way of fire with truth shining in it. He warns us it will be difficult, and cautions us against expecting too much, but bids us "enter the nar-row gate" because it is the way of life. When God was speaking to Joshua he told him to arise and cross the river Jordan, to take the people with him into the land which God was marking out for them. This needed some courage: it was no small thing for this young courage; it was no small thing for this young man to take the place of Moses.

Joshua was prepared, but even then he needed courage to face the people. They were not a very obedient crowd; they had a rebellious spir-it, and they relied upon this leader to keep them in touch with God. So after the "therefore", the logic of events, there comes an imperative --Arisel

No more argument, no more reflection: the time has come for action. Strike the tents, gather the people together: here in front of the Jordan, beyond is the new country and the new life, "Arise, let us go!" We all have our Jordans, and oftentimes we

make the mistake of thinking we can cross them by talking. There is a time for speech, for debate, but now comes the time for action. How easy it is to argue when the great need is for decisive movement!

We who are the Joshuas of the present day cannot ever have the genius of leadership and prophetic gifts of Moses, but God promises to be with us, to guide and encourage us.

THEOLOGIAN RAPS BARRY

NEW YORK ---Churchmen of all faiths have been urged by an influential publica-Protestant tion to reject the presidential ambition of Sen. Barry Goldwater, the Republican nomi-

nee. "Sen. Goldwater's oft expressed views are diametrically opposed not only to everything for which we have stood editorially but to everything for which America's three faiths stand in respect to international relations, civil rights and economic policy," the bi-weekly Christianity and Crisis said in an editorial.

The publication, "A Christian journal of opinion," is edited by Reinhold Niebuhr, the theologian, and John C. Bennett, pre-sident of Union Theological Seminary.

The editorial noted that this was the first time Christianity and Crisis had taken an official stand in a U.S. Presidential election. It has a small circulation but considerable influence among U.S. Protestants.
