Retraining Program Continues in Nevada

WASHINGTON-- Retraining of unemployed Nevadans under the Manpower Development and Training Act will continue to be a major Labor Department program in Nevada this fiscal year according to Senator Howard W. Cannon. Cannon said \$702,000 of the Department's

\$3.6 million Nevada budget estimate is earmarked for retraining classes.

Since the Manpower Development and Training Act was passed by Congress in 1962, nearly 2,000 jobless Nevadans have been authorized training in useful new skills. Courses have

been approved for Las Vegas, Carson City, Reno, and Fallon. Cannon said he had been successful in securing funds for retraining another 450 persons through a statewide program.

Other statewide programs, financed through the Area Redevelopment Act, have been conducted for 250 persons in Mineral and Lincoln Counties.

Largest single budget item is \$2,026,000 for Bureau of Employment activities.

Cannon said other major Labor Department estimates for Nevada through the next twelve months include \$470,000 for Bureau of Employee's Compensation Program; \$37,000 for the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training; and \$34,768 for Area Redevelopment Administration projects in areas of substantial labor surplus.

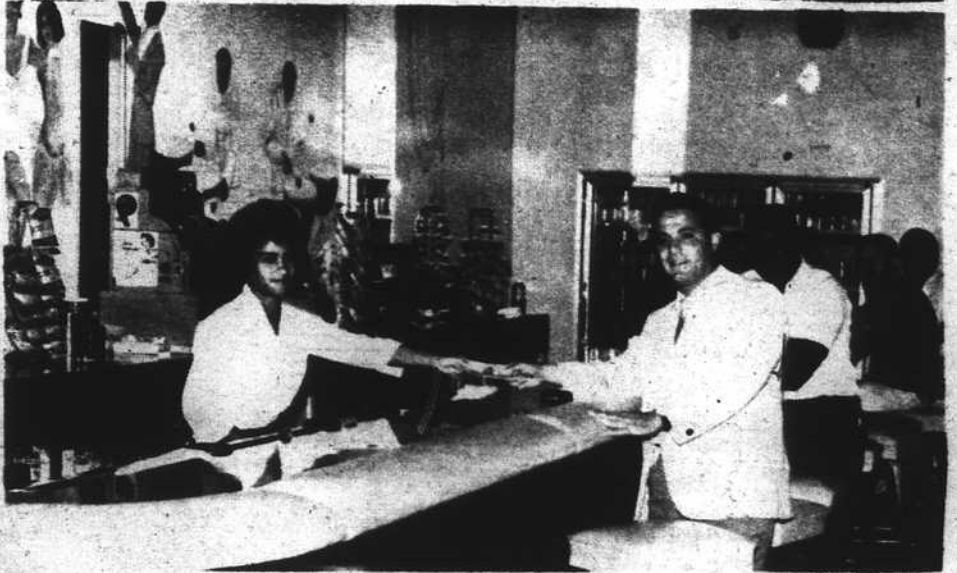
part to "watch for harassment of Negroes who cooperated with COFO."

He said Negroes who provided housing and those, including some employees of local governments, who tried to register to vote, risked economic retaliation at the least. Some Negroes have already lost their jobs this summer.

Those Mississippians who believe--and many do--that the student volunteers are a motly crew of kooks, beatniks, and radicals, and that the COFO movement is controlled by Communists, are deluding themselves.

QUALIFIED SOURCES here and in Washington say that a few persons with suspected Communist connections have shown up in Mississippi to work in the COFO program.

While they acknowledge a potential problem of Communist infiltration, they say the COFO leadership is "clean" and there is no evidence of Communist direction. Moses says flatly there is no Communist influence in COFO.
