

THERE ARE MANY professional football experts who believe that the amazing surge of the Oakland Raiders from a 1-13 won-lost record in 1962 American Football League competition to a 10-4 record last season was largely due to the inspiring play of offensive end Art Powell.

The 27-year-old Powell, who will see action at Cashman Field Saturday night (Aug. 29) when the Raiders meet the Houston Oilers in a Wilbur Clark Cavalcade of Charities attraction, was a sensational performer for Oakland in 1963.

With sprinter's speed and a basketball player's jumping ability, Art is virtually impossible to cover on one-on-one situations. He has magnificent "hands" and made numerous "impossible" catches for the Raiders last fall.

He was named to every AFL all-star team, including UPI, AP and The Sporting News, after leading the league's ends in yardage gained (1,304) and touchdown passes caught (16). Playing for the West in the league all-star game. Art caught the winning touchdown pass from teammate Cotton Davidson with less than a minute to play.

AN ALL-CITY football and basketball star

at San Diego High, Art won All-American JC honors as an end for San Diego Junior College in 1955 and went on to lead the nation's major college pass receivers at San Jose State in 1956 with 40 receptions for 583 yards.

He entered pro football in 1957 with Toronto

of the Canadian League and was outstanding as an end and defensive back through 1958 before joining the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League in 1959. He was the Eagles' leading kickoff return man.

Art wanted to play offensive end but the Eagles wouldn't move him, so he became a free agent in 1960 and joined the New York Titans of the AFL. In three seasons with the Titans, Powell established himself as one of pro football's finest ends. He was third in receptions (69) in 1960 and led the loop in touchdown receptions (14). He continued to be New York's greatest offensive threat in 1961 and 1962 despite hampering leg injuries. He signed with the Raiders at the end of the 1962 season. 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
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Raider Ace Plays Here FOOTBALL PRACTICE HAS STARTED IN AREA HIGHS
