CLEM DANIELS, the power runner from Prairie View A&M, certainly showed local football fans why he was selected the American Football League "Player of the Year" last season when he led the Oakland Raiders to a convincing 34-20 victory over the Houston Oilers at Cashman Field last weekend.

The big guy out of McKinney, Texas, electrified the 8,500 customers with his 68-yard touchdown dash in the first quarter that put the Raiders out in front to stay. But it was Clem's impressive 7.6 yard average on his other ten carries from scrimmage that caught the eye of scouts from other AFL clubs and convinced them that Oakland would be hard to handle again this year. Daniels' overall rushing average came to 12.8, best on either team by far.

Daniels and Bob Jackson of New Mexico State were the workhorses for the Raiders with 21 carries between them out of a total of 30 Oakland rushing plays. However, Houston's Charley Tolar, a product of Northwestern Louisiana State, was called upon to carry the ball 13 times from scrimmage and wound up with the best rushing average for the Oilers with a neat 4.9 average.

The rosters of both clubs are liberally sprinkled with Negro players, with three other Northwestern Louisiana boys in addition to Tolar seeking jobs on the Houston team. One of them, rookie linebacker Sammy Odom, was credited with nine tackle assists, best defensive record

by an Oiler.



Only Bobby Nichols (278), Arnold Palmer (279) and Gary Player (281) were able to out-





RAMS SPONSOR STAR'S TENN. DENTAL STUDIES

Former University of Southern California football star Ben Wilson will become the first Negro ever enrolled in the University of Tennessee dental school if the Los Angeles Rams can arrange it. And there is good reason to believe arrangements already have been completed.

Wilson, who won a starting assignment as fullback with the Rams as a rookie last season, originally had announced that he would attend the USC dental school this fall. But the Los Angeles pro club, hard-pressed for a "battering Ram" in the backfield, persuaded Wilson to return to the team this season in exchange for "certain considerations."

In reporting his return to the squad, the Rams revealed an arrangement had been made for the former Trojan star to pursue his education during the off season. They did not name the university, but it was understood to be Tennessee. The Tennessee dental branch is located at Memphis.

Coach Harland Svare stated in the Ram announcement that Wilson will be playing for the "same salary he signed for last year." This amounts to \$23,000 including his bonus for signing.

Technically, the statement is correct.

However, the big fullback, who was a member of the undefeated Trojan team of 1962, will receive an additional \$7,500 a year to defray his educational expenses in pursuit of his Doctor of Dentistry degree.
