Goldwater "Democrats" Lose in Georgia

ATLANTA, Ga.--Two avowed supporters of the loosely organized "Democrats-for-Goldwater" movement in the South have been defeated in Georgia Democratic primary runoffs

Johnson's Press Support Far Exceeds Kennedy's


NEW YORK, N.Y .-- Although a poll of American daily newspapers shows almost equal edi-torial support for President Lyndon Johnson and his Republican opponent, Sen. Barry Gold-water, newspapers backing the Democratic nominee have a big edge in combined circulation over those advocating the election of the Arizona solon.

Editor & Publisher, a newspaper trade maga-zine has received 828 replies from its poll of the nation's 1,754 daily newspapers. E&P reported that 243 dailies, or 29.3 per cent of those making commitments, support Johnson, compared with 250 for Goldwater, or 30.2 per

However, the 243 newspapers supporting Johnson represent 42.3 per cent of total daily circulation, while the 250 backing Goldwater account for only 17.7 per cent of the overall national circulation.

"Never before in the history of these polls has newspaper support been divided so evenly between two major candidates," said Robert U. Brown, publisher of the weekly magazine. "As of last week, with less than 50 per cent of the country's dailies reporting, President Johnson already had more newspapers lined up for him than John F. Kennedy had in 1960, and those papers have almost three times the total circulation of papers that backed Kennedy."

for Congress, thereby stirring speculation as possible national significance of the results. The contests had been closely watched for

indications of Republican Presidential nominee Sen. Barry Goldwater's appeal in the southern-most regions of Georgia, areas of strong racial feeling but traditionally heavily Democratic.

Many political observers have assumed that Goldwater must do very well in such districts if he is to carry the South over President Lyndon Johnson, his Republican opponent in the Nov. 3 general election.

In the Second District, former Lieut. Gov. Garland T. Byrd defeated Stephen Pace Jr., 22,568 votes to 22,149 in unofficial returns. Pace, son of a former Congressman, had declared himself a Goldwater supporter, while Mr. Byrd had declined to say how he would vote in November.

In the Third District, Maston O'Neal defeated Harry Wingate Jr., 27,632 votes to 27,035 in unofficial returns. Goldwater had endorsed Wingete on a visit to Atlanta Sept. 15. O'Neal had indicated that he would vote for the Democratic ticket in November.
