MUST BE PAID

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS for candidates, nominators and voters in the local NAACP biennial election of Dec. 13 at Kit Carson School have been spelled out by branch president Rev. Marion Bennett as follows:

1. Only members in good standing are eli-

gible to run for office or vote.

2. A candidate for office must have been a bona fide member of the branch at least thirty days prior to the date nominations were made.

3. Voters or those signing nominating petitions must have paid the minimum branch membership fee.

4. Fully paid Life Members of the branch

are fully eligible.

It is the responsibility of candidates and voters to secure and furnish proof of eligibility to participate in the election and have in their possession a receipt or membership card showing that their dues have been paid through December, 1964. Membership cards expiring in December, 1964, are valid for election purposes according to the Rev. Bennett.
