New African Nation Outlaws Polygamy

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast—A new civil code adopted by the Ivory Coast national assembly has abolished polygamy and contract marriage in this West African republic.

Its major effects will be:

1. To ban polygamy (the practice of taking more than one wife), described during parliamentary discussion as "a handicap to social

In addition, the new laws stipulate that every citizen of the Ivory Coast must have a patronymic (family) name, and one or more first names.

ALL FUTURE MARRIAGES must be by the mutual consent of the couple concerned, and celebrated by a civil authority. Divorce procedures will closely follow European laws.
